H. S. Martin, representing the
Northern Express Co., was in the
city this week, and Agent Gaylord,
of the P. R. & N., will take charge of

will close the Northern Express
Company's office at Bay City, as
there is not enough business there

Attorney Ralph Duniway, who
has been retained to fight the Port
of Tillamook case, has gone to
Washington, D. C., and will not
return until the end of the month.
The case comes up at the Novem-
ber term of the Circuit Court and
he is wanting it continued, but At-
torney H. T. Botts will insist on the
case being tried out at this term of
the court, for should there be any
error incorporating the Port, an-
other election would be immedi-
ately called.
A. G. Beals has leased the saw
mill of the Tillamook Lumber Man-
ufacturing Co. for three years and
has assumed entire management.
Another track will be put in so as
to unload logs into the slough from
cars near the dry kiln, and Mr.
Beals expects to cut out a large
stock of lumber the coming winter
to be ready for the trade next year,
as it is expected there will be a
large beach trade in lumber. Mr.
Beals was connected with the old
mill company when the saw mill
burned down.
It is expected that an agreement
will be arrived at between the prop-
erty owners on Garibaldi beach for
each of the platted townsites to con-
struct a main road through them at
their own expense. We understand
that a petition for the road, will be
presented at the December term of
the county court, and should the
property owners submit a proposi-
tion to help themselves similar to
what the property owner have done
to have the Bayocean road built,
they should be entitled to help from

the county, for any section of the
county which shows a willingness
to help itself, should have first con-
sideration and the first money avail-
able for road work.
The special election on Thursday,
to submit the question as to
whether a Port of Bayocean should
be created, carried with a majority
of 15 votes. Carnahan, which is a
rural precinct, put up a big vote in
opposition to it, while Barnegat
gave a much stronger vote in favor
of a port. The vote stood:
Against. For.
Carnahan 37 1
Barnegat 1 52
Total 38 53
It will be seen that one person in
Carnahan precinct voted for a Port
and one voter in Barnegat voted
against it.
Bess Pangborn vs. Quincy J.
Pangborn is a divorce suit filed in
the circuit court. These parties
were married at Burrook, Kan., on
February 3, 1903, there being
born of the union three children.
The grounds upon which the di-
vorce is sought, the complaint
states that the defendant, without
the consent of plaintiff, left her
home in South Center, Kan., tak-
ing with him their children and
came to Tillamook County and that
the defendant refused to live with
her and also refused her permission
to see her children. Plaintiff wants
a divorce and requires the defend-
ant to pay \$40.00 per month for her
support and the custody of the
children.

PORTLAND - TILLAMOOK
SERVICE MONDAY.
President of Pacific Railway
& Navigation Co. Makes
Announcement.
President E. E. Lytle, of the
Pacific Railway & Navigation Com-
pany, announces that he hoped to
have regular service inaugurated be-
tween Portland and Tillamook by
next Monday. In order to play ab-
solutely safe, the date for the official
establishment of service has been
fixed for November 10. There has
been some delay in the completion
of a bridge across Wolf Creek,
where a permanent structure is
being put in place of the false
work that was used for the recent
official tours of inspection over the
line. It will be several days before
the construction department will
have this bridge completed, and
then everything will be ready for
service.
Because of the great amount of
prospective business, both freight
and passenger, that has been
offered the new line to the Coast,
the original plan of operating a
mixed train each way a day has
been abandoned, and the regular
passenger service will commence
with a straight passenger train of
three coaches, each way a day.
The morning train out of Portland
will leave here over the Southern
Pacific at 7:20 a.m., connecting
with the Lytle road to Hillsboro,
leaving there at 8:50. This train
will arrive at Tillamook at 2:25 p.m.
The morning train from Tilla-
mook will leave there at 7:53 a.m.,
arrive at Hillsboro at 1:25 p.m., and
reach Portland at 4:40 p.m.
"Tremendous interest has been
aroused in the opening of the road,"
said President Lytle to-day, "and
if all the people who have tele-
phoned that they want to take the
first trip make good, we won't have
enough cars to haul them all. We
have simply been overwhelmed
with inquiries about service, trains,
time-cards and other matters, and
our offices practically have been
turned into a public information
bureau.
"We are going to start out on a
slow schedule until the roadbed
gets shaken down into good shape,
and will not attempt to make any-
thing like fast time until we have
the line in tip-top shape, and then
we shall be prepared to give as fine
service as any road in the North-
west."
