Hawley Visits Tillamook.

Representative W. C. Hawley paid Tillamook a visit on Tuesday, coming in on the delayed train at midnight, which interfered with the arrangements which had been made for a meeting of the different Ports and a public meeting. Owing to being called away Representative Humphreys was unable to come in. Wednesday morning Representative Hawley, with the members of the Port of Tillamook, and a delegation of business men, went down to the bay in the Frolic, visiting Bayocean and Bay City, where the party was entertained at luncheon by the people of that city.

Mr. Hawley explained to the members of the Ports of Tillamook and Bay City the statute of the Tillamook project to improve the bar, and the difficulties which confronted them, owing to the engineers at Washington, not only changing the plans which were desired by the local bodies and recommended by the Board of Engineers which was sent here to submit a project, but also as to the matter of the Ports contributing 50 per cent of the cost. He knew of no way whereby the project now recommended by the Board of Engineers could be amended. To attempt to do so would, no doubt, jeopardize the whole project and it would be years, probably, before another could be substituted, as the whole thing, such as another survey would have to be made. He hardly thought it right or just to the local people and the local engineer for the engineers at Washington to plan out and exact conditions in a project not having their approval, or what they desired, but they were up against a condition of affairs which was hard to overcome, as no appropriations would be made which did not have the engineers at Washington approval. He thought it might be a good plan if some one from Tillamook, who was conversant with the local situation and able intelligently to discuss, it was sent to Washington to appear before the Rivers and Harbors Committee, as it would have considerable weight. He promised to do everything he possibly could to procure an appropriation of \$400,000, and as he worked in conjunction with Representative Humphreys, he thought if there was a Rivers and Harbors Bill the next session of Congress he thought that amount, with local aid, could be procured for the improvement of the bar.
