SECTION 3.—There shall also be elected or appointed, as hereafter provided, mayor, recorder, marshal, treasurer, attorney, street commissioner and surveyor, who shall be officers of the municipal corporation. Beginning with the election held in December, 1911, each member of the common council shall be elected by the qualified electors of the ward of the city which he represents and the mayor and treasurer shall be elected by the qualified electors of the city. The recorder, marshal, attorney, street commissioner and surveyor shall be appointed by the mayor and shall hold their office during his pleasure. And

WHEREAS, At SAID ELECTION there were cast for said Ordinance No. 216, 110 votes, and against said Ordinance No. 216, 67 votes, and

WHEREAS, there was a majority of the votes cast thereon in favor of said ordinance No. 216.

NOW, THEREFORE, I do hereby proclaim that the said Ordinance No. 216 has been approved by the qualified electors of said Tillamook City, and is therefore in full force and effect, and the Charter of said City is amended as provided by said Ordinance No. 216.

EQUITY IN DISTRIBUTION OF ROAD FUNDS.

Settler Argues in Favor of Improving Roads in Sparsely Settled Districts.

It is no doubt true that there has never been a time when the public in general have taken such a keen interest in the subject of good roads as at the present time, and our newspapers and other periodicals abound with suggestions, good and otherwise; and the writer and his neighbors having for many years resided in a somewhat isolated portion of Tillamook County, have succeeded much from the lack of means of transportation, and waited somewhat impatiently and altogether unsuccessfully, during all this time for the honorable distributors of the public funds to dole out to us sufficient help to enable us to get to and from the county's metropolis without the use of a flying machine, and not being able financially, by reason of these hindrances, to accumulate sufficient of this world's goods to purchase a model of this latest means of locomotion.

This has caused the writer to note and reflect considerable on the inequality of the distribution of these funds and led him to question the wisdom of the policy of spending enormous sums of money on favored portions of the community while other portions are entirely neglected.

While this may on the surface appear to be founded on the old saw: "the greatest good to the greatest number" yet after all, will not the greatest good eventually come from the treatment of each and all of the members of the whole community with SOME consideration?

There is nothing calculated to build up a community faster than to develop its resources. A number of beautiful rich valleys with thousands of acres of productive soil in our own county are producing comparatively nothing because men with families will not move into a neighborhood that will shut them up like a rat in a trap.

These acres could and would, if the proper inducements were offered, be teeming with inhabitants, who like busy bees would send products to market that would bring a large increase to the public exchequer and contribute much to the welfare of the people.

The tendency of the times, and especially of late years, has been to drift from the country into the cities and towns, and this is caused largely by the stingy attitude of our public officials in granting to the people of these isolated portions of the community the share due them for road, school and other public benefits.

This is certainly a great mistake, and is one of the causes of the great unrest throughout our
