DEATH OF C. B. HADLEY. Passes Away in Portland, The Victim of Heart Trouble.

The news of the death of Clark B. Hadley, which reached here on Saturday, did not come as a surprise, for it was generally thought that when he left to be treated for heart trouble in Portland that he was near the end of his earthly career. When he left here he seemed to have lost heart and hope of recovery, but his relatives thought possibly that something ought to be done for him, so he was taken to Portland with that object in view.

Mr. Hadley was born in Wisconsin. There at the age of 22 he married Miss Anna Cleasly. He moved with his wife to Tillamook 29 years ago, when this section of the state was practically a wilderness. He has since been a large factor in its upbuilding. Before he moved to Tillamook he served two years in the Indian war, enlisting from Wisconsin. He married his second wife Athelia Anderson, in Tillamook, April 28, 1908.

Besides his widow, two sons and a daughter survive. They are Clark Edward Hadley, 767 Wasco street, Portland; David Joseph Hadley, engaged in mining in the Philippine Islands, and Mrs. P. J. Sharp, of Tillamook.

Mr. Hadley was for several years in the saloon business. He was also identified with the Tillamook Logging Co. and was manager of that enterprise, and for some time owned and operated the saw mill at Hobsonville.

The remains were brought to this city on Tuesday and were buried the next day in the Oddfellows cemetery, under the auspices of the O. O. O. F., of which he was a member, a large number of persons attending the funeral. Rev. D. L. Shrode conducting the religious services at the home.

JUDGE TELLS McNAMARA HE MERITS DEATH.

James B. is Sentenced for Life; Brother to 15 Years. LOS ANGELES, Dec. 5.—Two brothers—James Barnabas McNamara and John J. McNamara, natives of Cincinnati—the one slim, droop-shouldered and sallow-faced, with small eyes, and the other a broad, robust man of ruddy countenance—felt today the strong hand of Justice, which they long had thought to evade, the former being sentenced to imprisonment for life, and the latter to 15 years in the state penitentiary.

It was the retaliatory action of the law against the lawless methods which John J. McNamara, secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, thought it necessary to pursue in coping with what he regarded as the all-powerful opposition of capital.

Elder Brother in Tears. Though the younger brother, James B., in formally presenting his confession to the court today, declared that he intended no murder when he placed 16 sticks of dynamite beneath the Los Angeles Times building on October 1, 1910, 21 persons being killed by the terrific explosion, John J. McNamara, recounting tonight to his attorneys his principals, broke down as he muttered that he fought against great odds in the best way he could. It was a sequel to the courtroom scene earlier today, when he received his sentence in tears of object surrender.

For the crime of the Times building explosion James B. was punished; for directing the destruction by dynamite of the Llewellyn Iron Works, wherein no lives were lost, John J. was sentenced, yet hardly a few hours had passed when the word went forth that subpoenas would be issued for both men to appear before the Federal grand jury to divulge further details of their dynamiting conspiracies.

United States Steps in. The United States Government now will demand of them information concerning interstate trafficking in dynamite which is alleged to have resulted in more than a hundred explosions at bridges and factories where labor warfare was involved.

Something of the same fear of terrorism brought by these explosions flitted through a crowd of 15,000 persons today as it surged back and forth around the jail, expecting to see the McNamaras taken out into the open on their way to the Hall of Records, where previous scenes in the trial had been enacted. But the court and counsel, taking cognizance of possible lawlessness, held the final session in a courtroom adjoining the jail and the prisoners were taken thither over an interior bridge and passageway.
