A New Perennial Clover Discovered in Tillamook County.

A new perennial clover, a native of the Nestucca, is a specie of alsike, with the alsike food value, perpetuates itself from node buds and bulbs, having no bloom, flower, seed or sex. It may be run through a feed cutter and sown on meadow, pasture or prepared ground, and will yield 30 tons and up per acre. It thrives on any land red clover will grow and on land too wet and cold to grow red clover. May planting will yield a crop in July. One plant produces from 200 to several thousand plants.
