

COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Court convened Wednesday, Dec. 6, 1911. Hon. Homer Mason, Judge, presiding. H. V. Alley, commissioner; H. M. Farmer, commissioner; J. C. Holden, clerk; Henry Crenshaw, sheriff, were present.

In the matter of the compromise of taxes against the north east quarter of section 26, in T. 1 S. R. 8 W.; it appearing to the court that said property was sold to Tillamook county for taxes attempted to be levied and charged against the same for the years 1894, 1895, 1896, 1898, 1900, but that said lands were at the time encumbered by a mortgage to the board of commissioners for the sale of school and university lands, etc. of the state of Oregon, mortgage being foreclosed in the year 1900 and property sold to state under foreclosure, said N. P. Wheeler has since acquired title thereto, and it appearing that said attempted tax sales are void and of no effect, and said N. P. Wheeler having offered to pay county \$20.00 in settlement in order to have the record cleared, court accepted the offer and ordered that all of said tax sales for years mentioned be canceled.

In the matter of petition of Henry Tohl et al for county road, board of viewers having reported unanimously in favor of establishing road and there being no remonstrance, and the court being satisfied that such road will be of public utility, court orders road opened for travel.

In the matter of petition of N. McMillan and others for county road, beginning at Garibaldi and running parallel to right of way of P. R. & N. as far as Wheeler, court appointed U. G. Jackson, Fred Zaddach and F. M. Wakely, viewers to lay out road and make report.

In the matter of petition of H. E. Howard et al for county road, commencing at Nehalem city and running in a southeasterly direction following the most practicable route to point of intersection with Weeler county road, U. G. Jackson, Fred Zaddach and F. M. Wakely, are appointed as viewers for the laying out of said road and are directed to meet at Nehalem on the 28th of December for that purpose.

In the matter of the claim of Nathan Snyder and T. E. Lewton for damages, same is disallowed.

In the matter of the application of Horace H. Hayward and others for county road, same is continued.

In the matter of the petition of C. R. Funk, et al for county road, same is continued.

In the matter of petition of Fred Scherzinger et al for county road, same is continued.

In the matter of petition of S. T. Childers, and others for a county road, same is continued.

High School Flashes.

The Thanksgiving vacation is over but every one wishes that it had been longer. However, there will be three days more during the first of the week before Christmas and the regular year end holidays.

The Freshmen gave a very unique party at the school house last Friday night. Games were played during the first part of the evening, many of which were new and interesting. At eleven o'clock lunch was served, each plate being sold for fifty cents in order to raise the necessary funds to purchase the class flag.

According to the present arrangements our debating team will meet Nehalem at that place on the evening of December 22nd. The question is "Resolve: That the parcel post system should be adopted," the negative being upheld by the home team.

Every thing is debate at present. The pupils have just had one debate in the series of tryouts and will not know who the team will be until after next Friday evening. The debate will be with the Nehalem High School at that place one week from Friday night on the question, "Resolved that: The Federal government should adopt a parcels post in connection with the present postal system." The home debaters realize that they have a hard proposition when they debate Nehalem this year, considering they have the affirmative of the question, but if we die fighting.

Some more interesting times were participated in by the members of the High school the past week. However, this time it happened to be confined to the Freshman class. The plan was a great deal like that which was brought about in the case of the Student Body Attorney about a month ago. The Treasurer and another member of the class, who had done practically all of the work for the Freshman party, and who had charge of the money taken in, paid two small bills amounting to about \$1.15, without having asked permission first of the secretary of the class. As a result the secretary and sergeant at arms tried to run the other gentleman out of office and upon failing to accomplish this desired end they resigned. The running out jobs does not pay.

The boys of the school are intending to get their basket ball team started into the regular work and get themselves in condition to play a number of games this winter. At present there is plenty of good material in the school for a first class team.

There will be no school the first part of next week because of the Teachers' Institute which convenes Monday. It seems rather worthless to us to have school broken into in such a manner that practically two weeks of school will be lost. But this will be the case, as the regular Christmas holidays come week after next and the studying that is done Thursday and Friday of next week will not be worth considering.
