**NOVEL PLAN TO RAISE A ROAD FUND.**

## CITY COUNCIL MEETING. Movement on Foot to Break Up the Saloon Monopoly.

A meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening, over which Mayor Talmage presided. By unanimous consent the city council granted a saloon license to W. H. Wilson, but it being pointed out by the Mayor that granting this license it would deprive one of the present saloon keepers of a license, the council reconsidered the matter and rescinded the license granted to Wilson, who was the first applicant for a saloon license.

Saloon licenses were then granted to W. J. Stephens, B. J. Stephens, C. W. Clements, Johnson & Laughlin and H. Patterson. The city council then passed an ordinance to amend the city charter, so as to allow more than five saloons. This was passed unanimously, but Mayor Talmage has vetoed it. It will come up at the adjourned meeting of the council, which is Friday in next week, when the councilmen will either have to stay with the ordinance and pass it over the Mayor's veto, or reject it. It seems that if a saloon license is granted to Wilson he had promised to sell beer at 5c. a glass and keep a respectable saloon.

The tax levy was placed at 1 1/2 mills 5 mills for roads, 4 mills for general, 2 mills for water and 1/2 mill for library.

## The Mayor's Veto.

To the Honorable City Council of Tillamook City, Oregon: In relation to Ordinance No. 211, the same being an ordinance to repeal Section 12 of Ordinance No. 211, entitled an ordinance regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors, which was passed by your Honorable Body at a meeting held December 18, 1911. I beg to say: That the Home Rule Association of the State of Oregon, of which I have the privilege of being a member, is engaged in what they deem to be a work of great importance to the people of this State, viz: Of handling the liquor trade in all the incorporated cities of this State, in a uniform manner.

The Constitution of our State has been amended in such a manner as to give municipalities exclusive jurisdiction to legislate upon this subject and the only law you now have within the City regulating, restricting and controlling the sale of intoxicating liquors is Ordinance No. 211.

Before this Ordinance was passed, it was submitted to the Attorneys of the Home Rule Association and the objection was urged to the Ordinance, that it provided a greater number of saloons than the population of this town of Tillamook permitted under the rules adopted by the association in what it conceives to be its work and duty.

The Ordinance was passed, however, as written for the reason that five saloons already had obtained license in Tillamook City, before the ordinance was passed and before there was any law whatever in existence to regulate their conduct and there was no way of reducing the number.

For me to permit this ordinance to become a law and lay down the

bars for all classes of dive keepers, thugs and prostitutes and their parasites to come into this town and open up degraded places in competition with the men who are engaged in the traffic in this city, all of whom are men with some standing and some business interests common to us all, would not only be unfair to them, but would be in violation of my obligation to the Home Rule Association.

For these reasons I return this ordinance to you with my disapproval of the same.

## NEHALEM BAR PROJECT PROVES SUCCESSFUL.

Two Vessels Cross in on New Channel—13ft. at Half Tide.

Banker Frank A. Rowe was in from Nehalem on Wednesday and informs us that the Patsy and Gerald C. passed in over the new channel formed by building the jetty and that the south channel is filling up fast. There was great rejoicing in Nehalem on Monday over this event, and it is very gratifying to those who strove for bar improvements for Nehalem at the results obtained, which is bound to make that an important shipping port. When the vessels crossed in on Monday there were 13 feet of water on the bar at half tide. The Port of Nehalem has made a proposition to the government to have the jetty extended, and no doubt this will be accepted. The improvement of Nehalem bar enhances the value of every foot of land in the north part of the county and raises the value of timber in that vicinity many hundred thousand dollars.

Although the Nehalem country was kept bottled up longer than most parts of the county, the successful improvement of the bar places it far ahead of other parts of the county, for it is now in a position where lumbering industries can start in to operate and assured of railroad and water transportation in large ocean vessels.

Mr. Rowe is a booster for good roads and a more strenuous booster for a ten mill road levy.
