TILLAMOOK HIGH WINS.

In Debate with the Nehalem High School Over the Question of Parcels Post.

Last Friday morning the Tillamook High School debating team, composed of Reed Bain, Elbert Ginn and Benley Stam, left on the 8:55 train for Nehalem, to meet the Nehalem debating team in debate. The trip to Wheeler was very pleasant. However, it would have been more pleasant had it not been for the crowded condition of the train and the delay caused by a slide a short distance the other side of Bay City.

Upon reaching Wheeler the team, together with Prof. Ralph Moore, the coach and chaperon, an Elsie Lamb and Lena Epplert and E. J. Claussen, special friends of the debaters, took the Juanita for Nehalem, arriving at that place at eleven o'clock.

Most of the crowd had missed their breakfast in order to meet the train, and as a result when the dinner call was made a hungry troupe made their way to the dining room of the Tohl Hotel and did justice to the roast pork and gooseberry pie. The fair waitress was made to blush repeatedly by the orders sent in from the lips of Joe Bain, who seemed to have an immeasurable capacity and an uncontrollable appetite.

After luncheon a guide was engaged and the sights seen. Central Park was visited first, then the Skating Rink, the Enterprise building and last, but not least, Union Hall. A tour of inspection was also made through Abe's bargain store and Harley Morton's jewelry establishment. After the debate Benley Stam, the Tillamook star, was so excited that he danced with joy; Joe Bain had said all that he knew and had sat down on the bench trying to see something funny; and Elbert Ginn, who had yelled himself hoarse giving Nehalem a cheer, was so overcome when it was not returned that he made his way to the central office to phone the result of the debate to his home town.

The members of the N. H. S. team were Emil Schollmeyer, R. Tohl and Herman Schollmeyer, while those on the T. H. S. team were Reed Bain, Elbert Ginn and Benley Stam. The question debated was, "Resolved: That the Federal government should adopt a Parcels Post in connection with the Postal system."

It is expected that the home team will meet some team from the valley in the near future on the same question.

BULB CLOVER.

A New Perennial Clover Discovered in Tillamook County.

A new perennial clover, a native of the Nestucca, is a specie of alsike, with the alsike food value, perpetuates itself from node buds and bulbs, having no bloom, flower, seed or sex. It may be run through a feed cutter and sown on meadow, pasture or prepared ground, and will yield 30 tons and up per acre. It thrives on any land red clover will grow and on land too wet and cold to grow red clover. May planting will yield a crop in July. One plant produces from 200 to several thousand plants. Grows in the winter and frost does not affect it. Write for methods of cultivation.
