### THE SOCIALIST COBBLER

#### George Ross Jailed for Burglary and Safe Cracking.

Some little surprise was caused in the city on Monday when it became known that Sheriff Crenshaw had arrested George Ross, the cobbler who had a shop in the building belonging to the I.O.O.F., who was implicated in a number of robberies in this city, but what caused the most surprise was the fact that several young men have known for months that Ross was the guilty party but failed to notify the sheriff. Ross, it seems, is an ex-convict who served time in the state penitentiary. He is a rabid Socialist, a devotee to the Appeal to Reason, and a drug fiend. It was on account of Ross' intimacy with Mrs. Asp which caused Peter Asp to commit suicide. From information given by James Smith and Neil Hiner, it appears that Ross had told the boys that he was going to break into certain places and had threatened to do them bodily harm if they squealed on him, but Hiner had told his father that he heard that Elmer Hoag's safe in his machine shop was to be broken into, but Mr. Hiner did not pay any attention to it. A week ago last Saturday night the Tillamook Feed Company's store was broken into and the combination of the safe was worked and \$38 taken. Saturday night an attempt was made to open Hoag's safe with a chisel, but it seems that the burglar was scared away. On Monday the boys were questioned as to how and from whom they obtained their information, which caused Sheriff Crenshaw to place Ross behind the bars in the county jail.

A search of Ross' shop by the sheriff uncovered the money he had taken from the Tillamook Feed Co.'s safe and other money hidden there. Ross waived examination on Tuesday and was bound over by Justice Stanley to the grand jury, who fixed the bail at \$2,500. He also bound over Smith and Hiner as witnesses.

### Another Drowning Accident.

Another drowning accident took place on Sunday afternoon, when a young married man by the name of Jack Benton found a watery grave in the Trask river. Between one and two o'clock Benton, with two other young men named Joe Brown and P. Sherman, went to the Trask bridge, south of town, for the purpose of going down the bay in a gasoline launch. Owing to the heavy rains there was a swift current in the river. After getting a start Benton went to the bow of the boat to keep it away from the drift wood, but the boat coming in sudden contact with a log, threw Benton out of the boat head first. He came up and appeared to be making for the shore, when he suddenly disappeared, the swift current and his wet clothes carrying him down. The young men did what they could to save their companion, but the accident happening so sudden and river being almost on a rampage, they could not render the assistance they otherwise would had conditions been different. Although the river has been dragged for several days the body has not been recovered, the only thing recovered belonging to the unfortunate young man was his storm hat.

The deceased came here with his wife and child from Falls City, Or., a few weeks ago. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Benton reside in this city, where Mr. Benton is engaged in the horse shoeing and blacksmith business, and this bereavement comes doubly hard upon them, for they lost a young daughter quite recently.
