Walter Smith and Jap Perry were sentenced to serve nine months in the county jail by Justice of the Peace Miles, of Bay City, for stealing chicken belonging to Frank P. Hobson. Smith has been in trouble several times and served two sentences in the county jail. He cut the bars in the window of the jail and was on the point of making his escape when he was detected. It will cost the taxpayers \$450 to keep these two boys in idleness the next nine months.

The heavy rain storm on Thursday, which was accompanied by considerable wind, caused another blockade on the railroad. The train which left this city Friday morning did not get as far as Hobsonville and returned later in the day, owing to slides. There was a wash out on the Salmonbury, and it was Tuesday before train service was resumed, when the through train service to Portland went into effect. The entire county was without mail from Thursday until late Tuesday afternoon.

John S. Randolph was bound over to the grand jury by Justice Stanley charged with assault upon a young woman in her home in this city, the bail being placed at \$100. It seems that Randolph is from Portland canvassing some kind of art pillow. Having obtained admittance to the house it is alleged he made himself obnoxious, but persisted in going there, when the young woman's father scared him off with a gun. The Justice thought he had made himself too fresh with an unprotected young woman and for that reason bound him over.

There was a meeting of the Ports of Tillamook, Bay City and Bayocean at the Commercial Club on Thursday for the purpose of taking joint action for procuring harbor lights for Tillamook bay. These lights were once recommended by the inspector, but were turned down at Washington. Engineer Lockwood, of the Port of Bayocean, will make a plat showing where lights should be located, and this will be forwarded to Washington with the request for the establishment of lights. The Ports discussed other matters pertaining to the port, but took no action as to sending a delegation to Washington.

Died on Saturday, at her home on the Miami, Mrs. Mary Alleg, wife of John Alleg, aged 68 years. About a year ago she was stricken with paralysis, and the doctors said that whenever she had another stroke it would prove fatal. She was stricken again last week and she died from the effects. The remains were buried on Monday in the Bay View cemetery.

Firemen Have Annual Election of Officers.

The Tillamook Hose Company held their annual meeting last Thursday evening at which occurred the regular election of officers. The work for the past year was reviewed and an outline made for the new year's work.

The officers for the ensuing year are: Allen Page, President; John Aschim, Chief; Elbert Ginn, Secretary; Dr. Monk, Treasurer; Albert Plank, Captain Hose Cart No. 1; Thos. Coates, Captain Hose Cart No. 2; Drew Dawson, Captain Hook and Ladders; Ben Vantress, Captain East Division; and Art Case, Captain of West Division.

During the past year the Company with the aid of the City Council purchased an up-to-date Hook and Ladder Truck, have installed a siren fire whistle at the electric light plant with an alarm system connected with the Pacific Telephone office; and had on hand at the close of the year \$138.63. The company has been called out four times to fires and three times on false alarms. There has been but a few regular drills because of the absence of the Chief, but it is planned to have a number of them during the following season.

The matter was brought before the Company of people ringing the fire bell and blowing the whistle when there is no fire, attention being called to New Year's eve, and it was decided that anyone turing in an alarm would be punished the same as any other law breaker.
