

Prospects look bright for bar and narbor improvements this year. The project now before the Rivers and Harbors Committee calls for an expenditure of \$814,000 for the improvement of the bar, half of which amount is to be raised locally. The project was approved by the Board of Engineers and recommended by the Secretary of War, and an initial appropriation of \$200,000 is incorporated in the pending Rivers and Harbors Bill. With the Port of Tillamook case disposed of, the sum of \$150,000 will immediately become available for the improvement of the water front and Hoqu arton Slough, so that any vessel that can cross Tillamook bar will e able to reach Tillamoak City. The Port of Tillamook expects to connect the channel from this city with the Sturgeon channel, in the Port of Bayocean district, as it will maintenance, which Major Morrow estimated would be the cost to keep open the middle channel.

Report from Washington.

Representative Hawley today appeared before the House rivers and harbors committee and made an hour's argument in favor of liberal appropriations for commercial waterways in Western Oregon. While the committee held out no promises. Mr. Hawley received unoffical assurance that if the river and harbor bill is reported, all amounts recommended by the chief of engineers for projects now under construction would be incorporated, and this will hold good with regard to Columbia River projects not in Mr. Hawley's district, as well as those along the Coast.

The aggregate amout of appropriations that will be allowed for new projects has not been determined, but in view of Hawley's showing that local communities in Oregon are pledged to raise \$1,700,000 to aid in defraying the cost of various proposed improvements which have been approved by the engineers, members of the committee intimated be a saving of \$20,000 annually in that such projects would probably be given preferential recognition.
