LOOKS BRIGHT FOR BAR AND BAY PROJECTS.

\$150,000 to be Expended on Tillamook City Water Front and Channel to the Bay.

Prospects look bright for bar and harbor improvements this year. The project now before the Rivers and Harbors Committee calls for an expenditure of \$814,000 for the improvement of the bar, half of which amount is to be raised locally. The project was approved by the Board of Engineers and recommended by the Secretary of War, and an initial appropriation of \$200,000 is incorporated in the pending Rivers and Harbors Bill. With the Port of Tillamook case disposed of, the sum of \$150,000 will immediately become available for the improvement of the water front and Hoquarton Slough, so that any vessel that can cross Tillamook bar will be able to reach Tillamook City. The Port of Tillamook expects to connect the channel from this city with the Sturgeon channel, in the Port of Bayocean district, as it will be a saving of \$20,000 annually in maintenance, which Major Morrow estimated would be the cost to keep open the middle channel.

The Oregon delegation has been active in advocating the Tillamook projects, and should the Rivers and Harbors Bill be passed, both Tillamook and Nehalem will receive good appropriations.

Representative Hawley writes: "I was before the Committee on Rivers and Harbors yesterday (Wednesday) morning in behalf of the appropriation for Tillamook, in accordance with the report of the engineers, a copy of which I enclose. The Committee has not yet decided as to the scope of the bill they will present, as I am informed. I earnestly urged your claim and the co-operation you promise, as well as the needs of commerce. I believe the Tillamook project was favorably received upon my presentation. Our Democratic friends control the matter, of course, and whether they plan an economical bill has not yet been stated. Please advise me as to the outcome of the suit in regard

to the Tillamook Port, as that may have some bearing on the situation. I will continue to do all I possibly can in the matter."

Report from Washng.t.n.
Representative Hawley today appeared before the House rivers and harbors committee and made an hour's argument in favor of liberal appropriations for commercial waterways in Western Oregon. While the committee held out no promise, Mr. Hawley received unofficial assurance that if the river and harbor bill is reported, all amounts recommended by the chief of engineers for projects now under construction would be incorporated, and this will hold good with regard to Columbia River projects not in Mr. Hawley's district, as well as those along the Coast.

The aggregate amount of appropriations that will be allowed for new projects has not been determined, but in view of Hawley's showing that local communities in Oregon are pledged to raise \$1,700,000 to aid in defraying the cost of various proposed improvements which have been approved by the engineers, members of the committee intimated that such projects would probably be given preferential recognition. Oregon, in this respect, has taken a position in advance of most other states, and the committee is disposed to aid these communities which are interested to the extent of contributing materially to the cost of improvements.

Rushing Nehalem Report.
Delay in receiving the engineers' report on the Nehalem project and the possibility of its being delayed too long to get the item in the appropriation bill, led Congressman Hawley to take the matter up by wire last week. It is understood the report is being held in the San Francisco office, and the board of engineers has promised to hurry the matter, so the item will not be left out of the next appropriations.
