### Collecting the Taxes.

The sheriff began collecting taxes on Monday morning. All taxes paid between now and March 15th will be subject to 3 per cent rebate. The first half becomes delinquent first Monday in April; second half becomes delinquent first Monday in October.

Total valuation on rolls, \$14,339,662; railroad and telephone assessed by state, \$263,623; total \$14,603,285. Special school taxes, \$42,631. Total of Tillamook taxes, \$12,633,777; Port of Nehalem taxes, \$9,574.49; Port of Bayocean taxes, \$6,094.80. The total tax to be raised in Tillamook county this year amounts to \$337,375.98.

A large number of outstanding road warrants have been turned in by those holding these warrant to pay their taxes.
