AT LOGGERHEADS.

The High School Societies Vote to Disband.

Considerable trouble was caused in the High School the past week by the action of two or three juniors in their effort to break up the old literary societies which were formed by Prof. Whitney about nine years ago. The leader in the affair was the trouble maker who has tried to make school life like a civil war during the past year. Tuesday night the matter of either dissolving the two societies and forming one new one or reconstructing the present societies was brought up with Benly Stam, as chairman, Read Bain and Oscar Aschim as the principal opponents in the conflict. Aschim, who has been a leader in the Ciceronian Society for the past four years, defended the societies.

Those who were present state that Aschim had good logical argument, while his opposition merely made dogmatic statements without any proof, and when the question that the societies should be dissolved, was put to a vote, the negative won by a 36 to 40 vote. However, the knockers were not satisfied and called another meeting, and by ignoring all the parliamentary rules of order, the question was again voted upon. It was very evident that the opposition to the old order would win if possible and when the vote was cast, two votes were cast by different members in a number of instances, and they won by a 39 to 40 votes. Although the bribing and graft was self evident it is generally supposed that the vote will be allowed to stand, as the chairman made no mention of the unparliamentary proceedings.

The first semester is over and all the exams are finished. The senior, which consists of thirteen of the most influential members of the High School, are, as a rule, glad that they have only four months more of high school since there is nothing of any interest in school with the societies and society competition dead, but possibly the freshmen will make enough excitement so that things will not be entirely dead. If not the juniors will be called upon again.

To the School Voters of Tillamook City School District.

The School Board desires to have a good attendance at the school meeting to be held Saturday, at 1:00 o'clock. The needs of the district will have to be provided for, and the present idea of the School Board is that it would be the best plan to purchase the property lying just west of the present school property and erect another building there about the size of the present school building, with the plan in mind that in three or four years, if conditions require it, the two buildings can be moved to the different parts of the town and one large central building be erected on the present school site.

We expect to have an architect present at the meeting with plans and estimates of cost so that it can be known just what the district will be going into, and before action is taken the board wishes to have the matter thoroughly discussed by the voters, and then proceed so as to carry out the wishes of the voters themselves and insure the best results for the district.

Tillamook High Wins Again.

The debating teams of the Tillamook High School consisting of Benly Stam and Joseph Bain defeated the McMinnville debating team in the inter-scholastic debate which was held in the First Presbyterian Church last Thursday night. The decision was unanimous.

This was the third time that the date for the debate had been set and as Supt. W. R. Rutherford of the McMinnville schools had other appointments for the last of the week it was necessary to hold the debate Thursday evening. Uncertain railroad transportation was the cause of the former postponements of the contest.

Harry Stuart and Homer Stuart, the McMinnville debaters, together with Mr. Rutherford arrived on Thursday's train. They were met by representatives of the High School and taken to the home of T. H. Goyne where they were entertained until the debate.

The contesting teams took their places on the platform at 8 o'clock with John Aschim as chairman of the debate. As soon as the judges, Attorneys S. S. Johnson, H. T. Botts, and John Leland Hendersou, had been properly stationed in the audience, Mr. Aschim called attention to the rules for inter-scholastic debates and introduced Mr. Stam, the first speaker on the affirmative.

The question which was, "Resolved: That the Federal Government should adopt a parcel post in connection with the postal system," was very well handled by both teams.

After the debate the Senior Class, gave a reception in honor of the visiting team. Those present were: W. R. Rutherford, Harry and Homer Stuart, John Aschim, How-Lamar, Leslie Harrison, the Senior class and the faculty of the Tillamook High School.

City Council Meeting.

Mayor Harter and the members of the Council met at the City Hall to take up the large amount of work that was on hand for them. The first business taken up was a petition from certain residents in the south part of town to have a street opened. The petition was laid over until next Council meeting awaiting the completion of a map giving the location of each residence in that section of town.

A petition for the purpose of forbidding the running of a skating rink at Second Street and First Avenue West was also laid over. Considerable time was spent in investigating the condition of sidewalks. Mayor Harter brought up the dilapidated condition of some sidewalks, Councilman Knudson the condition in the south end of Stillwell Avenue and Second Avenue East and Councilman Maddux the need of sidewalks in Sunnymead.

The Chief of Police was advised to order a sidewalk built to the city limits on Stillwell Avenue and Second Avenue East and to order all sidewalks repaired. The matter of new sidewalks was referred to the street committee.

Councilman Knudson brought up the matter of the filthy condition of alleys and certain barns and restaurants and Chief Ranes was advised to work in connection with the City Health officer and condemn all unclean places and have every thing cleaned up.

An electric light was ordered in at Second Street and First Avenue West.

The usual bills were acted upon. The matter of forbidding the storing of explosives within the city limits was referred to the committee on Police and to the City Attorney.

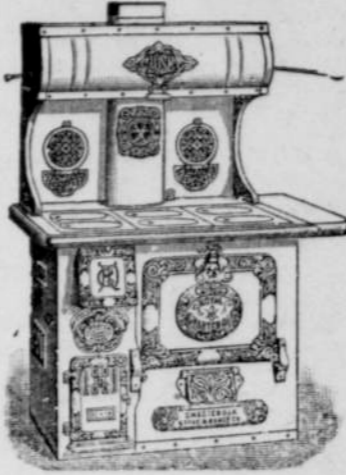
