TO BOND THE STATE. Taxpayers to Pay \$30,000,000 Interest for the Use of \$20,000,000.

We print below a copy of the bill which is to be submitted to a vote of the people and which Governor West is endeavoring to make a State law, and to create another political machine at the taxpayers' expense.

AN ACT. Entitled "An Act Creating a Bond Issue and Pledging the Credit of the State Thereto, for the Building and Maintenance of Permanent Roads in the State of Oregon."

Section 1. That the State of Oregon hypothecate, pledge and loan its credit for the building and maintenance of permanent roads in this state to the limit, and not in excess, of twenty million dollars in gold bonds for the term of thirty years, carrying interest at five per cent, payable semi-annually, and issued at the rate of two million dollars each year for the period of ten years, said bonds to run for the full term of thirty years from the date of their issuance respectively.

Section 2. That the Governor, Secretary of State and State Treasurer be and they are hereby empowered, authorized and directed as the bonding committee of the State of Oregon to arrange for and provide the terms of said bonds, preparation, issuance and marketing of the same to the highest bidder in lots as the same may be offered, but always at a price not less than par and at such premium in addition thereto as may be offered.

Section 3. That the proceeds of said bonds to the extent of each two million as issued annually hereunder shall, as required, be paid to and immediately covered into the State Highway Fund for the building and maintenance of permanent roads, as provided for under the laws of this state.

Section 4. All acts, or parts of acts, in any way inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this Act, are hereby repealed.
