S.P. PLANNING LINE ON COAST.

Engineers Examine the Country from Siuslaw to Tillamook.

Engineers Hoey and Fontaine, who have been engaged in supervising most of the construction work of the Natron end of the new main line cutoff of the Southern Pacific, have been doing reconnaissance work for the Harriman interests for what appears to be a 200-mile extension right down the Oregon coast line from Tillamook Bay to Coos bay. The line as reconnoitered would connect the recently completed Pacific Railway & Navigation company's road from Portland to Tillamook with the proposed Willamette Pacific line from Eugene to Coos bay, which is now under construction.
 This line would give the Harriman interests a continuous belt line with Portland, Eugene, Tillamook and Coos bay points as the important terminals. The ground covered by Hoey and Fontaine is a richly productive one, which has not had the proper industrial or agricultural development simply because the territory lacked suitable transportation facilities.
 The engineers started their preliminary work at Gardiner, which is at the mouth of Umpqua river and one of the important points on the Eugene-Coos bay extension. From there they went over the country northward and touched at Florence, the first point to be touched by the Eugene extension on the Pacific coast, and located at the mouth of the Siuslaw river. Thence going northward, the locators struck toward Yakima bay points, Toledo, Newport, Elk City, and traversed the fruitful Siletz and Grand Ronde Indian reservations on the way to Tillamook.
 They were at Tillamook looking over the terminal situation for several days before their identity was discovered.
 Their reconnoitering work seems to indicate that the Southern Pacific is contemplating early construction of a line down the Oregon shore. Such a line has been talked of for years, and many railroad location engineers have gone over the route, and from reports they have made there will not be a very large amount of heavy construction or difficult engineering problems to be overcome.—Telegram.
