

Thence going northward, the locators struck toward Yakima bay points, Toledo, Newport, Elk City, and traversed the fruitful Siletz and Grand Ronde Indian reservations on the way to Tillamook.

They were at Tillamook looking over the terminal situation for several days before their identity was discovered.

Their reconnoitering work seems to indicate that the Southern Pacific is contemplating early construction of a line down the Oregon shore. Such a line has been talked of for years, and many railroad location engineers have gone over the route, and from reports they have made there will not be a very large amount of heavy construction or difficult engineering problems to be overcome. -Telegram.
