**L. C. ROGERS SAYS IT IS SUPERIOR TO ASPHALT.**  
**Engineer Thinks Best Pavement Is Cheapest.**  
 In discussing the subject yesterday for the information of citizens and taxpayers, Mr. Rogers gave his opinion as an engineer, in which he unqualifiedly stated that bitulithic is the superior pavement. He said in part:  
 "Asphalt is not suited to the conditions in Astoria. It is very slick, and when the weather is wet and cold, horses can't get a purchase, because asphalt can't make a rough surface, which is required on hills such as we have here. Bitulithic, however, roughens, and in Portland it has been a success on hills. It has given satisfaction on two streets in that city that have 21 per cent grades.  
 Bitulithic is much better in wearing than asphalt. A piece of bitulithic which I took, myself, from Fifth street in Portland, where it had lain for eight years, shows little wear, altho this street carries about as heavy traffic through the year as any street in that city."  
 "In my judgment, bitulithic would last forever on the residence streets of Astoria. That this process of pavement is far superior to ordinary asphalt has been proved in the larger cities time and again. Bitulithic is a permanent pavement. It does not go to pieces, and hardly ever has to be repaired."—The Morning Astorian.
