To E. C. Sowle and Lucy J. Sowle, the above named defendants: In the name of the State of Oregon, You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit on or before the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, and if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the said court for the relief demanded in the complaint herein. The relief demanded is the foreclosure of a certain mortgage executed and delivered by you to the plaintiff in said suit on or about August 12th, 1910, bearing said date, to secure the payment of five promissory notes executed by you for \$380.00 each, bearing the same date and payable respectively on or before 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 years after that date, with interest after date at the rate of six per cent. per annum, which said mortgage conveyed to the plaintiff 40 acres of land off the East side of the West half of the South East quarter of Section 4, in Township 2 South, Range 9 West, W.M., except 2 acres square out of the South East corner of said tract, all of the above tract of land being in Tillamook County, Oregon, and for the recovery of a judgment against you for the amount of said indebtedness, with interest. For the further sum of \$200.00 as attorney's fees, and the costs and disbursements of this suit, and that the said mortgage be foreclosed, and the said property sold for the purpose of satisfying the said mortgage, and that you and each of you, and all persons claiming under you be forever barred and foreclosed of all right, title, interest or estate in or to said property, or any portion thereof, save the statutory right of redemption, and that the purchaser at the sale be put into the immediate possession of the property, and for such further relief as may seem equitable.

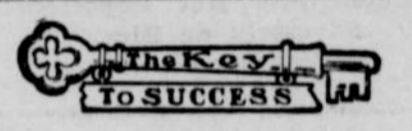

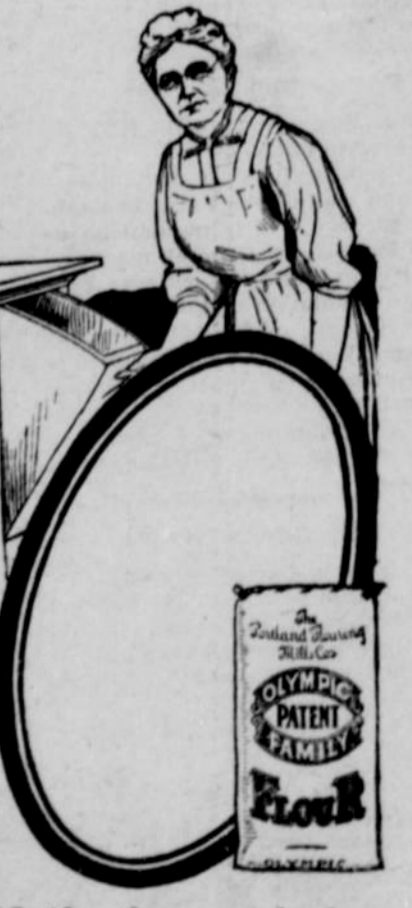
