Last week he returned to the city with the object of, he said, bidding on a wood contract. He was arrested by the city marshal and placed in durance vile. Next morning Constable Raines took a breakfast to Ross, when, much to his surprise, he found that his prisoner had flown. We understand that Mayor Harter will offer a reward of 15c. for the arrest of Ross, dead or alive.

MRS. C. B. HADLEY TIES UP THE ESTATE.
Wants an Accounting and a Receiver Appointed—Attorney Claims \$25,000 Fee.
Mrs. Stella Hadley vs. C. E. Hadley, D. J. Hadley, Maud Sharp and C. W. Talmage, administrator of the estate of C. B. Hadley, is a suit filed in the circuit court on Tuesday for a temporary restraining order restraining C. E. Hadley from conveying any of the real property belonging to the estate of C. B. Hadley; that the defendant, C. E. Hadley, be required to make an accounting; that plaintiff's dower in and to all said real property be measured and assigned; that C. W. Talmage be appointed as temporary receiver; and that the court allow plaintiff a reasonable attorney's fee.
The plaintiff alleges in her complaint that the defendant, C. E. Hadley, now holds in his possession or under his control more than \$180,000 of personal property which was earned by the partnership and received from the sale of property, and that no settlement or accounting for any of the property has ever been made by or between the said partners.
Attorney Oak Nolan represents the plaintiff, who knows a good deal about the financial affairs of the Hadleys, who did their business at the bank of C. & E. Thayer, of which Nolan was the cashier when that institution was in existence. Nolan claims that \$25,000 is a reasonable attorney's fee to be allowed him in this case.
