In the case of Mrs. Otelia Hadley vs. C. E. Hadley et al., C. E. Hadley has filed his answer to the complaint, in which he alleges that he did not at any time enter into a partnership with his father, C. B. Hadley, and that the latter never had any interest in the property standing in the name of C. E. Hadley. A motion was also made to dissolve the injunction, which was granted by Judge Galloway upon a bond being given.

Sheriff Crenshaw has collected about \$250,000 in taxes, and of that amount \$72,477.64 were in outstanding general and road warrants, which entailed a large amount of extra work during the tax collecting time as the interest had to be figured out. It will take the Sheriff several days before he can get caught up with the work and everything posted and a settlement made with the County Treasurer.

In regard to the establishment of a mail route between Tillamook City and Cloverdale, the bids submitted could not be considered because the bidders have used obsolete postal forms, and for that reason it will have to be readvertised. In the absence of a properly executed proposal at a reasonable rate, the Department will be unable to award the contract. The postmaster has been supplied with the proper proposed blanks.

Captain Emmett Jenkins, with about forty passengers, left this morning for deep sea fishing, in the gasoline launch Henrietta II. It is thought that a good business can be worked up in deep sea fishing and shipping the fish to Portland. As it is no trick to catch tons of fish outside the ber in a very little time the matter of disposing of them is a question, but with railroad facilities it is thought that this may be turned into a profitable business.

We have received a copy of the Rivers and Harbors bill, as recommended by the committee, and that part which refers to Tillamook says: "Improving Tillamook Bay and bar, Oregon, in accordance with the report submitted in House Document Numbered Three hundred and forty-nine, Sixty-second Congress, second session, and subject to the conditions set forth in said document, one hundred thousand dollars, for maintenance of improvement, five thousand dollars in all one hundred and five thousand dollars."

In the supplementary report there is this stipulation: "Tillamook Bay, Ore., on condition that the local communities should contribute one-half the amount of \$14,000, the estimated cost of the project."

COUNCIL MEETING.

Railroad Still Wants to Monopolize Front Street—The "Lid" for Skating Rink.

There was a meeting of the City Council on Monday evening, when several ordinances were introduced and considered.

A skating rink ordinance, which prohibits the running of a skating rink within 210 feet of any dwelling, unless permission has been obtained from the property owners, calls for a bond of \$500, and the rink to close on Sundays and at ten o'clock at night.

The P.R. & N. ordinance was indefinitely postponed, and another ordinance introduced, which gives the railroad three tracks on Front street; one of which is to be used as a common user.

The Portland & West Coast Railroad had a franchise for a tract on Front Street, the ordinance being read the second time.

Earl Ford and W. T. Kimball put in a bid to construct side walks which was 4c. per foot and \$3.50 for crosswalks.

The City Council adjourned to meet on Wednesday, and after meeting that evening adjourned until tomorrow (Friday) evening.
