HITS THE CLIMAX. Average of 53c. Per lb. for February Butter Fat.

Following are the prices that will be paid for February butter fat next week, according to estimates made by Carl Haberlach:

The Tillamook Creamery, 52.2c.
 Clover Leaf Creamery, 53c.
 Cold Springs Cheese Factory, 53.9c.
 South Prairie Creamery, 54c.
 Long Prairie Creamery, 51c.
 Three Rivers Creamery, 52c.
 Maple Leaf Creamery, 51 1/2c.
 Fairview Dairy Association, 54.7c.

Owing to some factories receiving considerable new milk, while others were getting mostly winter milk, there is a great difference in prices paid, owing to the tests and yield. Thus the Central factory will be the only one below 50 cents for butter fat, cheese being made only every third day. Fairview yield was the highest, running 11 pounds with mostly fresh cows milk.

Factories paying the highest prices per 100 pounds of milk were, Fairview, \$2.06 9-10; Maple Leaf, \$2.05; Tillamook Creamery and Clover Leaf Creamery, each \$2.04. As a rule the lower testing milk made as much cheese as the higher testing milk, as cheese was made oftener from the lower testing or fresh milk.

February Butterfat Prices in California.

Prices that were paid for butterfat by creameries through California during the month of February having been extremely favorable to the producers. Not in many years has the month passed with such a high average. The Review has received reports showing that 40 cents has not been unusual. From Humboldt county our correspondent sends us the following report of prices paid by the creameries of that county.
