

Editorial Snap Shots.

The Circuit Court docket appears to be growing every term of court, for cases are becoming more numerous. So many persons have been sued that those who have not been dragged into court ought to feel lucky.

Let well alone. That is one of the strongest arguments in favor of the re-nomination and re-election of President Taft, and that appears to be the sober judgment of those who want to see the country remain prosperous.

What's the matter with the hook and ladder crew of the Hose Company? No effort is made to take the new cart out of the city hall when an alarm is sounded. Fortunately it was not needed at the recent fires, but had it been required and not on hand it would have been necessary to go back for it, causing much delay.

The special city election on Friday is to correct a few physical impossibilities which crept into the city charter and to straighten out a few other irregularities, so that the city council can proceed intelligently in the improvement of the city. It is simply passing the ordinances which were submitted and passed before with a few corrections. When this is done the city council will proceed with the improvements which will make Tillamook an up-to-date city.

Another old timer passed away last week who was somewhat of a peculiar character, yet one of those who played his part in the early development of Tillamook County. Captain J. J. Dawson will be remembered for the interest he took in the weather, and the predictions he used to make about what kind of weather would prevail on certain dates. The old gentleman has gone to his rest, but he is included with the early pioneers of this county whose names we honor and revere.

Ben W. Olcott, the governor's appointee for Secretary of State, "knifed" the Republican ticket at the last election is now asking Republicans to support him for that office. It is men like Olcott who helped drag the Republican party of Oregon down to defeat. He contributed \$1,500 towards Governor West's campaign expenses and the governor appointed him to a good fat office to repay him. We do not see that Olcott is entitled to Republican support, who plays traitor to the Republican party, and now asks its support at the primary election.

It is a number of years since Tillamook County had a representative in the State Senate. It was customary in former years to pass this around in the joint senatorial district, but it is a long time since Tillamook County was represented in the senate by a Tillamook man. Attorney H. T. Botts, one of our best known and capable citizens, was induced to make the race in the interest of the county. All must admit that he is a strong man for the position and it would be a credit to this county to send Mr. Botts to the senate, for he is a man of affairs and qualified for the position. Tillamook county should give Mr. Botts a unanimous vote next week.

The Democrats are foxy, for they have united on Dr. Harry Lane for United States Senator, with the hope that if Senator Bourne is nominated they will elect Lane. And it would not surprise us much that they have figured it out about right to win the election, for they know the last time that Bourne ran the Republicans "knifed" him, and even in Tillamook County about 250 Republicans voted against Bourne and for the Democratic candidate for State Senator, and we expect that the number will be much greater if Bourne obtains the nomination. These are stubborn facts and not sentiment. Bourne has the advantage in a three-corner fight and the Democrats will win the fight if Bourne is nominated.

As no one aspired to become a candidate for Republican Joint Representative, the office went begging until Attorney T. B. Handley consented to run and look after Tillamook's interests if elected. He did not have time

to circulate petitions, so it will be necessary, so as to secure the nomination, to write his name on the ballot. As he is a young man of good ability and uses good horse sense in most things, it is well to encourage young men like Mr. Handley to positions of honor and responsibility. Give him a chance and we believe he will make good. Anyway, Tillamook should have a representative in the house, and the way to obtain that is to write Mr. Handley's name on ballot for joint representative.

A Strange Kind Of Republican

Ben W. Olcott is flooding the state with printed matter telling the voters that he is a candidate for the office of secretary of state. He assures the voters that he is a life long Republican, and asks for the support of the Republican party. Judging from Mr. Olcott's printed matter, one would be justified in believing that he has always regarded anyone who is not a Republican as a menace to the public welfare and a snake in the grass.

There are a number of facts, however, that sadly weaken a belief in Mr. Olcott's staunch and dyed-in-the-wool Republicanism. Among them is an affidavit of campaign expenditures filed at the office of secretary of state. The affidavit reads:

"I, B. W. Olcott, being first duly sworn, depose and say that I have made the following contribution to promote the interest of Oswald West, candidate for Governor at the recent election, to wit:
To West Booster Club.....\$1500
To James R. Coleman, Chairman..... 50
"Subscribed and sworn to before me at Salem, Oregon, this 22nd day of November, 1910.
I. P. LINN,
Notary Public for Oregon."

Why should Olcott, who would have us believe that he is a Republican of the deepest dye, contribute \$1150 to help elect a Democratic Governor? If a man who says himself that he is not a millionaire is so anxious to see a Democratic Governor elected that he will contribute \$1550 to his campaign fund, why should he subsequently appeal to the Republican voters to re-elect him to office? Would it not be more consistent for him to appeal to the Democratic voters? In that case, he could point with pride to the \$1550 that he had expended for the good of the cause, and could claim that he was entitled to something in return.

Fifteen hundred and fifty dollars is a nice and tidy sum. When a man who says he is a Republican contributes that amount to a Democratic campaign fund, it cannot be denied that he is anxious to see a Democrat elected. And when the Democratic Governor to whose campaign fund the amount was contributed appoints the donor to fill the first vacancy that occurs during his administration, does it not almost seem that there was an understanding?

A Booster For Bitulithic Paving.

J. G. Gable, one of Lewistown, Idaho's most prominent men, is an enthusiastic advocate of bitulithic pavement, says the Missoula, Mont., Sentinel. He firmly believes that this city will make no mistake in laying that kind of pavement on any or all of the streets.

"It is equally adapted for residential or business streets, as has been conclusively demonstrated at Lewistown," said Mr. Gable. "From the outset it was found so thoroughly satisfactory in Lewistown and so fully up to the representations of its manufacturers that the City Council wisely decided there was no need of experimenting further in paving materials or in contracting for other materials that it was plain none could prove more satisfactory from the standpoint of durability, economy and general satisfaction. The result was that all of the paving in Lewistown, of which there are five or six miles on the principal streets, is bitulithic.

The people of Lewistown are so well satisfied with it that there is little prospect of any other kind of paving material being used there. We are content to let well enough alone."
