About Moral Conditions.

Editor Headlight,— You told us through the medium of your valuable paper not long since that the authorities were cleaning up the town, but you did not say just how it was being done. We thought you meant a moral clean up, as your paper seemed to indicate.

But in the same paper you mentioned there had been a good many drunks on the streets or something to that effect. All the change that I have noted through our locals was the arrest of two young men for vagrancy. Now if vagrancy is a crime and the worst to be found in your little city you must have a very clean, moral town and one that the whole county may well feel proud of.

But is that really the case? Is there none worse than vagrants? The definition, wandering, wandering from place to place without any settled habitation, unsettled. Now if these indicate a crime punishable by confinement in jail on bread and water diet, why have we paid so much for board and care of such criminals? It occurs to me the less the offence the greater the abuse of the offended and the more determined are the executors of the law to punish.

There are quite a number of greater criminals committing greater crimes every day of the week in your town and making it a disgrace to the whole county. If the officers of the law do not know that to be a fact it is because they have determined not to know and will not do the work necessary to find out.

What are the saloons, gambling places and their accompanying evils doing for the upbuilding and good morals of your very promising little city, located in one of the best counties in the state, enjoying an almost perfect climate and surrounded with beautiful scenery? It seems to me it should be a very clean moral city, and I am sure it contains many good moral people, but why are so many dark blots permitted to cast a black shade on an otherwise clean and beautiful city?

Do your citizens ever take time to think why so many promising young men at different times have gone wrong in your little city? It is natural for young people to crave amusement, especially those who spend most of their time on the farm at work. They naturally incline to the city to find it, and where must they look? They meet someone on the street that is very friendly and seems to be interested in them. They are easily drawn in and step by step, and then jump by jump, down they go until soon they don't know where they are at.

I don't say this is all done at once, but after the associations are formed then the slide is so easy they don't realize what road they are on until they run against a stump or some other obstruction that makes them look around and wonder where they are.

But the attractions continue the same and with more and more power until the victim no longer has any control of himself and is then considered a fit subject for law enforcement to show the people that the law can be enforced when desirable to do so. I will ask if there is anything in the treatment of those two young men calculated to improve them? Do you think the one that was in jail fed on bread and water will be better prepared to settle down and go to work after a course of such diet? I am taking up more space than you will be willing to allow. I will have to stop this inexhaustible subject for the present. Hoping heads of families will consider the real cause of young men going wrong and for the sake of their own, if for no other reason, vote when they can for the benefit of others as well as their own loved ones.
