

THE HADLEY SUIT. Plaintiff Claims that C. E. Hadley Jilted Her—Marriage to C. B. Hadley Stopped Breach of Promise Suit.

Attorney Oak Nolan has made reply in the Otelia Hadley case vs. C. E. Hadley case, in which he sets out that plaintiff and C. B. Hadley were married and lived together as man and wife until the time of the death of her husband, and by reason thereof plaintiff is seized of an estate in dower in, and to the use during her natural life of their home. That no part of said property has been inventoried in the estate of the deceased. At the time of his death, C. B. Hadley was the owner in fee simple of the property, but the naked legal title therefor stood in the name of the defendant, who was holding the same in trust. A short time after the deceased died the defendant wrongfully took possession of the property and now claims to be the owner. Plaintiff has demanded her dower interest which is refused her. The plaintiff cites that the deceased built the house at a cost of \$4000, and secured the necessary money for doing so. That some time on or about the year 1885 the C. B. Hadley and defendant duly made and entered into a general partnership, which continued until the death of the former. The original capital of the partnership was \$2000, and all property purchased after that date is included in the partnership, and valued at \$75,000, and that the defendant now holds in his possession or under his control more than \$180,000 of personal property belonging to the partnership. That defendant is using the whole for the benefit of himself and claims to be the absolute owner in his own right. Plaintiff further alleges that for a great many years, and in fact from early womanhood, the plaintiff and C. E. Hadley kept company and were most confident friends and were engaged to be married, which continued until the year 1902, at which time defendant willfully jilted the plaintiff and married another woman. By reason of such conduct plaintiff became greatly distressed and humiliated; she was the subject of public gossip and became sick and threatened to sue for breach of promise of marriage. That immediately after the jilting C. B. Hadley made love to the plaintiff and offered to marry her himself. During the time that plaintiff and defendant were engaged to be married defendant repeatedly represented and told plaintiff that C. E. Hadley was an equal partner and joint owner with him. The defendant knew that C. B. Hadley was

making love to the plaintiff and had made offer of marriage. In order to procure plaintiff's consent to such marriage, and to discourage plaintiff from prosecuting an action against defendant for the breach of promise, the defendant and C. B. Hadley both represented and told plaintiff that C. B. Hadley was an equal partner and joint owner, but both of said parties failed to tell her that the legal title to all the property stood in the name of C. E. Hadley alone. It was a matter of general reputation that a partnership existed, and by reason thereof plaintiff finally agreed to enter into marriage with C. B. Hadley and waive her right to prosecute defendant for breach of promise. C. B. Hadley told plaintiff that she would be endowed at the time of his death with an interest in all of the personal property, and by reason of these and other allegations, plaintiff claims one half interest in and to all of the real and personal property.
