Death of Mrs. F. Severance.

It is with deep regret that we have to announce the death of Mrs. Sophia R. Severance, which took place in this city on Tuesday morning after several months sickness. The cause of death was cancer of the breast. The deceased was one of the best known and highly respected women of Tillamook county. The funeral services were held at the home this afternoon, the Rebekah lodge having charge of the services, with Rev. J. T. Moore, of the M. E. church, officiating in the religious ceremony.

The bereaved husband and family have the heart felt sympathy of a large circle of friends in their hour of sorrow which have bereft them of an affectionate wife and a loving loving mother, as well as a constant friend and a good woman. Sophia R. Severance, youngest daughter of Edward and Abbie Weston, was born in Somerset County, Maine, April 21st, 1850. In 1857, at the age of seven years moved to Pierce County, Wisconsin.

Married in August, 1873, to Frank Severance at River Falls, Wisconsin, and in 1880, moved to Yamhill County, Oregon, and the following year to Tillamook.

Was post-mistress from 1883 to 1892, having resigned; afterward was secretary for several cheese factories for a number of years.

First Worthy Matron for Star Lodge, being a Charter Member. Charter member of Rebekah Lodge, having held the position of Noble Grand several terms.

Past treasurer of State Rebekah Assembly of Oregon. Received degree of Chivalry at Grand Lodge last year. This being the highest degree conferrable upon a Rebekah.

Died, April 16th, at the age of 61 years, 11 months and 26 days, and leaves beside her husband one son, Egbert D. Severance; one sister, Mrs. Jos. Severance, of North Yakima, Wash., and two brothers, H. E. Weston, of Tillamook, and I. F. Weston, of Motley, Minn.
