CONTRACT LET.

High School Building to
 Cost \$20,668--\$2,900
 for Heating.

The School Board of District No. 9 let the contract for the new high school building on Monday evening to Ralph R. Wheaton, the bid being \$20,668 and the hot air heating bid to McPherson & Co. for \$2,900. The new building will contain eleven rooms.

The other bids were as follows: Dennis D. McLaren, of Salem, \$23,342; C. L. Wood of Portland, \$28,900; Wechter & Wood, of Salem, \$28,048; Snook & Traver, of Salem, \$22,080; Welch & Wright, of Salem, \$22,060.60.

TAKES BITULITHIC.

City Council Decides on
 the Light Standard at
 \$1.78 Square Yard.

The tentative bids for street improvements having been referred to Stannard & Richardson, the engineers, for recommendation, they recommended asphalt at from \$1.55 to \$1.70 per square yard for the pavement of this city. Upon Mayor Harter's return from Portland last week he brought with him a sealed bid from the Warren Construction Co., which was opened at a meeting of the City Council on Friday evening, the bid being heavy standard bitulithic, \$1.98 per square yard; light standard bitulithic, \$1.78 per square yard, whereupon the city council passed a resolution in favor of using the bitulithic on account of the cut in price.

ATTEMPT TO HOLD UP SCHOOL BONDS.

James Walton Made Some Startling Allegations.

Judge Galloway signed a temporary injunction on the complaint of James Walton, restrain School District No. 9 from selling certain bonds to Fred Glenn, of the First National Bank of Denver, Colo. Plaintiff in his complaint alleges that the school district entered into an agreement whereby they attempted to employ Fred Glenn to sell \$35,000 worth of bonds for \$35,700, and to pay a commission of one per cent to cover all legal expenses and the furnishing and printing of bonds. That at the time the said Fred Glenn was making said contract for the purpose of purchasing the bonds for the defendant Keeler Bros. for less than they were worth, and to receive compensation from both school district and Keeler Bros. And the defendant's county treasurer and school district and officers were entering into a contract for the express purpose of selling the bonds for less than the best price obtainable for the purpose of defrauding the taxpayers of the district. In pursuance of said conspiracy the school district and its officers and all the defendants wrongfully, wilfully and intentionally are about to deprive the school district and its taxpayers among them the plaintiff, of the sum of \$2,965 at the present time, and to compel them to pay six per cent interest for at least ten years. That under the law it is the duty of the defendants before offering for sale any bonds to give notice to the State Land Board and to advertise the same, which had not been done. Plaintiff claims that he and other parties gave notice that they would offer to buy bonds upon a five per cent basis or offer a premium therefor of at least \$500, and that the school board informed the plaintiff that they were not ready to issue and sell bonds.
