There will be an excursion from Hillsboro to Tillamook on Sunday, and it is reported that a large number of rooters from that place will accompany the Hillsboro base ball team which will play the Tillamook team. Several days ago over 300 tickets had been sold for the excursion, and when the train pulls into this city on Sunday it will be the heaviest excursion train to reach this city from the Willamette Valley. The train will leave Hillsboro at 7 a.m. and will arrive about eleven o'clock, the return trip will be made at 5 p.m. The game of base ball will start at 2 p.m.

Dr. G. S. Wright, president of the Automobile club, stated at the meeting of the automobilists held Monday evening that Governor West was willing to send a camp of convicts to improve that portion of the Tillamook road extending from the reservation bridge to the toll road, a distance of about six miles, if interest is shown in the matter. That stretch of road is almost impassable and should be improved. By using the convicts the cost of improvement will be reduced to the minimum.—News Reporter.

The Port of Bayocean case, which took all day Thursday and Friday, was not finished when court adjourned on Friday, and it was decided that the arguments should be made in Salem on the 10th of May. The principal grounds upon which the Port was attacked was in regard to the imperfect description of the territory, that it was improperly described on the ballots, that the judges of election had failed to properly indorse the ballots, that property in other water sheds had been incorporated, and that the Bayocean people had imported men to take part in the election.

Trains on Sundays.

Commencing on Sunday, the P. R. & N. will start a daily train service. The trains will also carry mail, but as the Postal Department has issued permits the postoffices to close on Sundays. Postmasters who have these permits are not compelled to sort the mail until the next morning.

The time of leaving this city and Portland will be on the present time schedule. It is not known at present whether the mail clerks will work on Sundays or whether the mail will be sent through as "dead head" express and sorted the next morning.

Lynn Eberman Goes to Pen.

There was a large attendance in the Court House on Friday afternoon to hear the sentence passed upon Lynn Eberman, who had been indicted by the grand jury on the charge of rape. Eberman pleaded guilty to attempted rape and as this satisfied District Attorney McNary, the more serious charge was not pressed. The prisoner took the three days or grace in which sentence could be passed, and in that time a petition was circulated asking that the Judge parole Eberman, and on Thursday evening a showing was made by his attorneys that leniency should be exercised. However, when Eberman appeared before the Court for sentence Judge Galloway had made up his mind that it was for the best interest of the community to send the prisoner to the State penitentiary. He told Eberman that there may be other young men equally as guilty as he was but he would have to send him to the State penitentiary, for it was a most serious crime he had committed. He thereupon gave Eberman an indeterminate sentence, which is from 1 to 15 years in the State penitentiary. He told Eberman that after one year he could be paroled, if his conduct was good, and he would use his best endeavors to secure his parole after he had served 12 months in the penitentiary. Sheriff Crenshaw took charge of the prisoner and locked him up in the county jail.

Fishing Schooner Vida Is Wrecked.

Driven from her course in entering the harbor Saturday afternoon, the fishing schooner Vida, of Seattle, struck the North Spit at the entrance to the bay and was wrecked. Her crew of five men were rescued by the lifesaving crew from Garibaldi. The Vida will be a total loss.

In command of George Nelson, the Vida, which is a gasoline-driven craft, had been outside the harbor's entrance exploring the harbor banks. As she was returning Saturday afternoon at ebb tide the boat was forced from the channel, her rudder carried away and, despite efforts of all on board, pounded onto the spit.

The boat's plight was seen at Garibaldi and the lifesaving crew hurried to the scene and removed the five men on board from the craft, which now lies partially submerged, with the waves breaking over her. The Vida was loaded with fish caught during the day.

Besides Captain Nelson, whose home is at Seattle, other men saved are Joseph Paul, engineer, Seattle; Edward Martin, steward, Seattle; Herman Tieson and George Thompson, both of Bay City.

Struck by a heavy wave, the

schooner's rudder was carried away, and helpless, she drifted until she struck the north spit.

The Vida was a two masted schooner of 63 tons burden and 63 feet long. Until recently she had been fishing in Alaskan waters. She arrived here Thursday from Seattle. The boat belongs to the Oregon Coast Fishing Company, of Bay City.

Captain Farley, of the Life Saving Station, was in this city last Saturday afternoon, and when the report of the accident reached this city Captain Groat took him to Garibaldi.
