What we now know is that Mrs. Isidor Straus of New York refused life to accept death with the husband with whom she had come hand in hand down the years of sunshine and shadow, partaking of his joys and sorrows as he had partaken of hers, the mother of his children, the bearer of his burdens as he had been the bearer of hers, the man to whom she had pledged her troth in her youth and between whom and herself there had long been that sweet communion of soul and spirit which had survived all the shocks of life in a world of manifold tribulations.

They urged her to save herself. The lifeboat was waiting. The husband who had chosen a manly death for himself that others might be saved, added his urging to that of the others. There were their children waiting beyond the latitude and longitude where they were going down. There was a long life of ease and comfort for her, to be filled with the sweet reverence of children reverencing her sorrow, and the prattle of grandchildren to lighten its gloom. But when they sought to separate her from the man whose life had so long been a part of her own, she clung to him, disdaining life without him, and went down to death in his arms. This is the picture which, more than all others silhouetted against that black night, glorifies the race. There may have been many teenage women who did likewise. There may have been other women who left the ship in hope of a rescue of those left behind. But this woman made for the world a picture of conjugal love, bright, vivid and lasting, to set against the weak and wild complaining of the multitudes crying out of loves which die and cannot endure the trials of a workaday world. Her voice is like an echo of the voice of that elder mother of her race who answered love with love and said: "The Lord do so to me, and more also, if I should be parted from thee."—Globe-Democrat.
