Benton's Body is Found.

The body of Jack Benton, who was drowned in the Trask river on Sunday afternoon, January 7th, was found in the cut-off of that river on Tuesday. Benton with Joe Brown and P. Sherman, were going down to the bay in a boat the day he was drowned. There was a freshet in the river at the time, and when the boat struck a log it threw Benton out of the boat head first. The state of the river was such that his companions could not render any assistance and Benton was not able to battle against the current, and he was soon drowned. The deceased came here with his wife and child from Falls City, Oregon, about a week before the accident. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Benton, reside in this city.

The body was found by F. A. Armstrong, and Coroner Hawk came to this city and held an inquest. The remains were buried in the Oddfellows' Cemetery on Wednesday.
