One of the good roads bills to be voted upon next November is to allow counties to bond for good roads, and there is not much doubt but what it will become a law under our new system of legislation.

The primary election in this county again proves the fact that farmers will not hold together. When it came to re-nominating one of their own class for county commissioner a large number voted against him.

Another funny mix-up was brought about in the primary election in Massachusetts. The people's choice for president was Taft, and their choice for delegates to the Republican national convention were men who had pledged themselves to vote for Roosevelt.

We have business men who take no interest in the welfare of the city, and who will not associate with those who are endeavoring to boost the city and county. For that reason we have repeatedly advocated casting aside any and all personal differences and pull together for a common purpose.
