Editorial Snap Shots.

Give the Portland business men a loyal and hearty welcome to Tillamook next week.

Men who stand on the street corners and "knock" and defame public officials rarely ever put their shoulders to the wheel of progress.

There is some talk of recalling the school directors. It is only waste of time, for the recall law is inoperative. Anyway it does not apply to school districts.

Get the auto craze and travel in modern fashion. Some of the farmers have been discarding their old plugs, and to be up-to-date our business men are keeping pace in taking joy rides over the county.

Attorney-General Crawford rendered an opinion that the recall law is inoperative. Since then he has given another opinion to the contrary. So as to decide this point the gentleman should have the recall invoked on himself, so that we may know for sure where we are at.

The way to straighten out any and all differences of opinion in regard to the school bonds and the school contracts is to get together and hear both sides of the controversy. It is easy enough to repeat statements which are not true and peddle them as gospel truth. Get together and get at the true facts of the case, and, then, perhaps, there won't be much difference of opinion. There is a tendency for people to go off half cocked, anyway, before they hear both side of a question. Get together and talk it over.

The matter of building a new hotel is practically settled, as enough money is subscribed amongst the business men. It is to be hoped that those who are interested in this enterprise to provide first-class accommodations will do so. It will be a mistake to cramp or confine it to small rooms and insufficient in number. It would soon become a second class hotel and leave the field open for a first-class hotel. Our impression is that it will be much more of a financial success to have a large first class hotel than a second class hotel.

Quite a number of persons are objecting to the improvement of the city. This is not to be wondered at. The same thing happened at all the cities which have put down hard surfaced pavement, and we expect to see the same thing occur here also, viz., those who now strongly oppose this kind of improvement to become the biggest boosters for it. This is the experience of all the wide awake towns in Oregon, and which have transformed sleepy looking towns into live business centers, with enhanced valuation in all kinds of property.

tor. According, then, to Senator Bourne's logic, the people of Oregon are a lot of blamed fools and have not arrived at that degree of political civilization and intelligence the senator has.

Colonel Roosevelt is denouncing the political bosses. To a casual observer, we are of the opinion that the colonel is one of the most successful political bosses in national affairs, with plenty of boodle furnished by the special interests backing him. But like most politicians who have been successful, the colonel has reached that stage where it is rule or ruin. There is a good deal of the pot calling the kettle smut in politics, and when we hear the self-righteous politicians prate about their goodness and honesty, there is not much difference in them, for they all appear to use every cent of boodle they can get hold of to obtain votes. It is money which makes the mare go, moves the wheels of industry, and, besides many other things, plays an important part in national politics.

The failure of the life saving crew to reach Tillamook bay last week again proves that the Garibaldi life saving station should be provided with a motor boat. Anyone with any common sense knows that it is impossible to handle the boat with expedition while a gale of wind is blowing when manual labor has to be depended upon. It is plain that life saving stations are far from up-to-date when they are not provided with modern equipment. The accident to the life boat at the Argo wreck was conclusive enough that the old boat should have been replaced with a new motor boat, but thus far the station has not been provided with a motor life boat. Some one needs a little jacking up and public censure, for it is endangering the lives of the life savers to send them across a rough bar or through the breakers in a boat that is old and antiquated.

The announcement was made by the railroad officials in February that the season ticket rate would be \$4.00 from Portland for the round trip and \$3.00 for Saturday to Monday, which would place Tillamook beaches on equal rates with Seaside. For some reason the Southern Pacific Co. has placed the rate on the P. R. & N. for the Saturday to Monday trips at one and one third rate, which is \$5.67. The distance from Portland to Seaside is 120 miles, while to the Tillamook beaches it is 90 miles. It may be that the railroad officials, on account of the lack of hotel accommodations in this city and at the beaches, are not desirous of rushing a whole raft of persons into the county at one time, but as the P. R. & N. expects to bring 50,000 persons into the county this summer, surely the rates ought to be on an equality with Seaside.

One of the provisions of the minimum wage law which is to be submitted to a vote of the people, which covers piece or contract work, specifies that if a person fails to earn \$2.50 a day, he is to be paid that amount of money. This bill has the approval of the labor organizations, and it is safe to say that it will receive united support from wage earners. Those who so strongly advocated the Oregon system never stopped to consider that class legislation would eventually be forced to the front and that the law placed a weapon in the hands of cranks and knockers and those who have personal grievances. We presume this is what is so flippantly called the sovereign will of the people, and no matter what the labor organizations and wage earners demand, if they have the votes, they can enact them into law, no matter how unjust they are or how completely the law would paralyze the industries of the state.

Do not get the impression that the proposed State Highway Commission is going to be a good thing for the good roads movement. However, it is about safe to predict, notwithstanding that the people beef about high taxation, they will vote to create another tax-eaters commission at Salem under the Oregon system. Some of the leading Granges have endorsed a State Highway Commission and are advocating the passage of the bill. We do not think that it is the correct thing for

the State to butt into road work for, we contend, that this should be left to each county as at present. For instance, Tillamook county has made more rapid development in road building than some of the other counties and expended considerable money, and it would not be the exact thing to tax this county to improve roads in counties which have not made the same progress this county has. It is true that a large proportion of the burden would fall upon Multnomah county, but as there are so many persons owning automobiles in Portland there is not much doubt but what a large proportion of the State road tax would go towards building roads for their benefit.

The petition circulation habit is a farce, so much so that most everybody signs them, no matter whether an injustice is being done innocent persons. An instance of this occurred in this city last week when R. R. Wheaton, the contractor who was turned down in the high school building, had the recall petition prepared and induced some of our misguided citizens to peddle it around to secure signatures, and, strange to say, upon the untruthful statements, and not in any way concerned about the real facts, some of our citizens signed the petition to recall the school directors. We have made some enquiries in this matter and we want to say that the directors should be commended for turning down Mr. Wheaton, as any person will admit who is fair-minded and not prejudiced. And at the proper time we suppose the directors will make this public, and those who have been peddling around false statements will find they did wrong in not ascertaining the real facts. This matter again proves that some little personal strife still exists in this city, and that some of our citizens are not disposed to get together in a gentlemanly manner and discuss disagreements in a fair, unbiased manner that will be just and fair to the accused as to the accuser. We are sorry that any of our citizens signed the recall petitions, but it is to be hoped that they will be more careful not to sign recall petitions before the veracity of those who peddle them can be substantiated. This is no time for personal strife in this city in an effort to pull down public officials, but it is a time to get together and stand back of those who are honestly performing the duties imposed on them.

VICTORY FOR BITULITHIC PAVEMENT.
