SEAPORT ADDITION TO TILLAMOOK.

Mill and Factory Sites Campaign, Now Planned by Leading Portland Firm.

One of the epoch making events of Tillamook county, which has been anticipated and looked forward to for the last 20 years will take place on May 25th when Clark Cannon Company, of Portland, and Kollie W. Watson, of Tillamook, open their campaign for mill and factory sites in Seaport Addition to Tillamook, thus assuring deep water transportation for Tillamook and contiguous territory and adding one more large feature to the transportation facilities and insuring the requisite mills and factories at the head of deep water transportation only one mile from the center of Tillamook City.—Oregonian, May 21st.

Death of J. P. Allen.

We have to announce the death of J. P. Allen, which took place at an early hour on Tuesday morning, after a short illness, although he had not been in the best of health for several years. The funeral took place on Thursday, when a large number of sympathizing friends were present to pay their last respect to the deceased and in sympathy for the bereaved.

John P. Allen was born in Sweden, November 1, 1836. He stayed there until he had served his two years in the army, then with his brother he came to America, going directly to Pennsylvania. Not liking it there they went to Kansas City, Mo., for a short time before going to Junction City, Kansas, where he married Nellie Austenson, on November 5, 1870. He worked at his trade of stonemason for some time until he took up a homestead ten miles from Clay Center, Kansas, where he lived for three years. After this, he moved to Clay Center and was engaged in the mercantile business for seven years. He then moved to Denver, Colorado, and was engaged in the grocery business for another seven years. He moved westward going to Redwood City, California, to invest heavily in the flour milling business which proved to be his first financial failure.

Hearing of the timber resources of Oregon, Mr. and Mrs. Allen, in company with two other families, came to Tillamook twenty-three years ago and took a pre-emption claim nine miles south of Tillamook. Leaving his family here he was called to Portland to follow his old trade and worked on the Perkins Hotel. Upon completion of this he returned to Tillamook and has since engaged in the hotel business,

being so employed at the time of his death, which was for over twenty years, making hosts of friends as his hotel was always full.

He leaves to mourn their loss his widow, his daughter, Mrs. J. C. Holden; his son, Elmer Allen; four brothers, one in California, one in Oklahoma and two of Clay Center, Kansas; two sisters also of Clay Center, Kansas, and other relatives.

He was a member of the Macabees, Fraternal Union and Knights of Pythias.
