#### To Make Murder Unpopular.

Massachusetts has an excellent plan for cutting down the number of murderers. It cuts the murderers off just as soon as it gets the requisite evidence against them. Ideas of emotional insanity will not save them if proof of their guilt is obtained. Brain storm, temporary insanity, protracted, has shielded many men and women slayers in the last three years which have passed since temporary mental irresponsibility was successfully invoked in Macfarlane's favor in New York, at that excuse does not get acceptance in the Bay State. "Hanging for murder is played out in New York," exclaimed Jack Reynolds, an obscure slayer in the city a third of a century ago. That immunity did not work in his case, because he put up a challenge jury and judge which they dared not dodge. He suffered the extreme penalty, not so much for his crime as for his truth telling, for a score of murderers in that state had escaped within Reynolds' recollection, though brought to trial. Richeson's murder of the Linnell in Massachusetts was worse than a crime, it was a blunder. Had been committed a few miles away, New York, he probably would have been acquitted before this time, some sort of subterfuge, and be kicking the streets a free man. A comparative stranger there, Richeson perhaps was excusable for not knowing that it enforced honestly, seriously, every statute which was its books, bad and good alike. He taken the precaution to company of the natives or old residents before he committed his crime mistake would have been avoided. Gov. Foss does not believe in capital punishment, but he enforces law as he finds it. A person who hates the death penalty and still believes that no murderer of recent years deserved it more than does Richeson whose sentence Gov. Foss refuses to commute.

A new French liner has just made a run across the Atlantic at a speed of over twenty-three knots, but adds to the score the announcement that the ship carries twenty-two life boats and thirty two life rafts that will hold 1000 more persons than the maximum passenger capacity. The Titanic catastrophe has given the world a shaking up.

"The friends of constitutional government will be in control at Chicago," said Mr. Taft. "That," said the colonel, "mean nothing else than that they will be in control of the national committee." #### Summer School for Teachers at the Agricultural College.

To the Editor:  
Some time ago we mailed you copy of the illustrated bulletin of the Summer School. This letter is addressed you to invite your cooperation in securing the attendance of public school teachers for the purpose of enabling them to get some preparation along the line of the industrial branches. The pupils' contests this year will awaken a great interest in agriculture and household arts, but next year our teachers and principals and other supervisors must be able to propose some advancement or the interest will soon wane.

The College has arranged special courses for the six weeks' summer school, June 18 to July 28, to better prepare the teachers not only to organize and conduct these contests but to provide some practical instruction in the elements of agriculture and household arts for the regular school course. It is not generally understood that the State school law requires the teaching of agriculture in the seventh and eighth grades of every public school. A text-book has been adopted and the subject has been taught, in a way, for five years. The reason so little is known about and so little value has resulted is because the teachers are wholly unprepared.

Now that there is a state-wide interest in the development of Oregon's wonderful resources and a belief that our schools should give the pupils at least some appreciation of the importance of it, something of a practical nature must be done. If a few of the rural teachers and the town schools can have the advantage of six weeks' study at the Agricultural College, at least a beginning can be made. Those teachers whose previous education will permit, can take up some of the advanced courses in agronomy, horticulture, etc., etc., and prepare for more systematic instruction.

State Immigration Agent C. C. Chapman, and other officers of the Oregon Development League advise that an effort be made to provide a part or all of the expenses for those teachers who are enterprising enough to give up their vacations and put in six weeks of hard study. This might be done either by boards agreeing to raise their salaries for the next year or by the community clubbing together. \$60.00 will cover all the

necessary expense, in addition to the rail road fare. The increased value of such a teacher's work in the school would many times justify the outlay.

Mr. John Aschim, of Tillamook, has been appointed by the State Forester as Supervising Warden for Tillamook County. He will have charge of all State, County and private patrol work in this County, and co-operate with the Forest Supervisors of the National Forests to the greatest possible extent. He can be reached by telephone when in Tillamook at Main 1511 Bell phone.

It is to be hoped that residents of the County will give him their hearty support and consult him in regard to burning permits, etc., of a local nature. He will be in touch with all local wardens and will gladly refer requests for information to the warden nearest you for any information or assistance he may be able to give. A list of local wardens, with their addresses and telephone numbers, will be published in the local papers, when such appointments are made.

It will be impossible for the State Forester to personally inspect all the work done by the numerous supervising wardens in his employ, and their success will depend very largely upon the support they receive from the people whom the Forestry Law is intended to aid and protect.

#### Bitulithic Pavement Is Required.

Committee, after inspection of both bitulithic and Powers Macadam, recommends former, says the Kalispel (Mont.) Interlake.

The committee chosen to make an inspection of and to report on different kinds of pavement, recommended the bitulithic, such as has been laid on First avenue east. The report is in part, as follows:

On examination you will find that number 4, or the bitulithic is very hard. This sample was taken with much difficulty, as you would remove a block of cement, while the other samples were dug with a pick as you would remove macadam.

From all that your committee could learn they feel that while the court house or Powers pavement would be all right where the travel was light, for the four blocks on Main street we certainly can not afford to experiment and as between the kind of pavement considered we unhesitatingly recommend bitulithic such as is now on First avenue east.
