Dear Sir,—The Board had under consideration your letter of the 25th and I am directed to inform you in compliance with Section 3939 of Lord's Code, on March 14, 1911, the following order was entered on the records of this office:

"The Clerk was instructed to trace on the plats of his office, the right of way of the Tillamook Bay Railroad and Navigation Company in T. 1 N. R. 10 W. and T. 1 S. E. 10 W., as indicated on the plat filed in his office by the said Company."

The Attorney General informs us that on May 22, 1912, he wrote you relative to the matter and the Board see no reason why his suggestion should not be complied with. You will notice that the order above referred to does not grant them a right of way but simply authorizes the tracing of their right of way on the plats of this office and the law also provides that this right of way be excepted from all conveyances of lands made by the state.

Convict Labor on Roads.

To the Editor:
Just a few words of thanks and comment in explanation of my letter to you last week.

Now you say I take an illogical view of the situation and that it is unfair to use convict labor for manufacturing it is also unfair to use such labor on road work. Ye Gods! Mr. Editor, do you think I would advise placing Convict Labor in competition with the farmers and those who depend upon road work for their living? Never for a minute. This is a very deep subject and one, as I mentioned before, worthy of consideration. I don't take snap judgment for my contentions Mr. Editor, and I only became enthused with the needed reforms in our penal and other state institutional work after years of study and practical demonstration, in which I have taken special interest. Just to simplify the situation let me explain that in my letter formerly, I spoke of Convict Labor being properly handled. With the Uphold, instead of placing penal inmates in competition with free roads, there will be a necessity for more free road workers than are now employed. Another thing is that you will have roads that will prove necessary to the success of the farmers along such roads which will not get in other ways if you shout until dooms day.

Use Convict Labor on the hills, in the quarries and in the difficult places where it would take great expense otherwise to do this properly with free labor. Let the farmers do the hauling and level grading wherever possible.

Believe me your road workers will be few and far between if you provided decent means for them to transport their produce to market.

Build better roads, remove the stumps and have farms worth thousands instead of ranches worth hundreds of dollars. The way is open to you. Why not all work together to reach success.

TILLAMOOK IS IMPROVING

Big Contract is Awarded for Bitulithic Paving.

TILLAMOOK, Ore., June 3—At a meeting of the City Council Wednesday night bids were opened for the construction of a sewer system and for bitulithic pavements.

The contracts were let to the Warren Construction Company for 60,000 square yards of bitulithic pavement and it is stipulated that work is to commence in three days after the contract is signed. This will give Tillamook City about 60 blocks of hard surface streets.

This award was made after the most thorough investigation of the merits of different kinds of paving by a special committee which visited the leading cities and personally inspected all classes of pavements.
