

Tillamook Beat Portland Cubs

Inspired by the precedent which they have set for winning games this year, the Commercial Club team of this city defeated the Portland Cubs at the Gilford Stillwell Park Sunday by a score of 2 to 1.

Seldom is such an interesting game witnessed in amateur baseball, but the matched condition of the opposing teams seemed to make it impossible for either to cross the home plate. Many times during the game were the bases populated, but no one could hit when hits were needed to win the game.

The first run was made in the second when Smith, the Cubs' second baseman, made home on an error.

However things were evened up in the third when Armbruster came in on a hit by Mellis after King had placed him on third by a two base hit.

Things stood even up to the 11th of the ninth inning, when Edmunds ran out a punt, took second on an error at first and scored on a two base hit by Peterson.

The main features of the game were the batting of King, who secured three hits out of four times up and Peterson who made the only three base hit of the game and the pitching of Millis, Tillamook's south paw.

The visitors tried to have the game called while the score was tied by making excuses, but Edmunds started things off by finding the right fielder's glove which he claimed he had lost. Things had to move during the last half of the ninth for there were only four minutes in which to play, and the game was to be called at the end of the ninth so that the team could catch the excursion train for Portland that evening.

Death of Mrs. J. A. Dawson.

Mrs. Nancy Magdalene Fleming Dawson passed quietly away at her home in this city Monday night at eleven o'clock after an illness of several weeks duration.

Late in the winter Mrs. Dawson was taken sick with typhoid fever, which compelled her to give up her school at Hebo and come home. The typhoid developed into an acute form of heart trouble bringing, on a very complex form of sickness which the doctors were unable to cope with. Life was finally brought to a close by paracarditis. Mrs. Dawson was conscious to the very last and her last words were to her friends and family who were gathered about her bedside.

The funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon from the M. E. Church.

Nancy Magdalene Fleming was born in Greenville, Tennessee, in August 1862, where she spent her girlhood until she went to the Newman Seminary to complete her education.

On June 2, 1887 she married Mr. J. A. Dawson. To this marriage were born three children, Carl, Eliza V. and Cloyd O. The first two were with their mother at the time of her death while Cloyd who is attending school at Eugene was unable to arrive in time. Besides her husband, three children and her mother, Mrs. Dawson leaves five step-children, of whom two Henry and Drew are living at home, Jay of Hoquiam, Wash., and two girls, Mary Morgan and Julia Settlers, of McMinnville. These and a host of friends and relatives mourn their loss.

The greater part of Mrs. Dawson's married life has been spent in Oregon, they having moved to this state in September of the year of their marriage. About fifteen years of this time has been spent in Tillamook County.

She will be remembered as a loving wife and mother, and a friend to every one with whom she met.
