LA GRANDE ADOPTS GRAVEL BITULITHIC

Warren Company Gets Contract.

To the surprise of many the Home Paving Company withdrew its bids at the council session this morning on First Street, Main and Washington Avenues, says the La Grande Observer. Mr. Bramwell and Mr. Roesch of the Home Company appeared in person stating that they had found sentiment against delay in the work and therefore withdrew their bids, but asked to be considered in future work. The council immediately let the paving contracts for the three streets to the Warren Construction Company for Bitulithic pavement.

Weonas Defeat Commercial Club by Close Score.

The Tillamook Commercial Club base ball team of this place lost their first game of the season at the Gifford Stillwell Park when the Weonas team of Portland defeated them 5 to 3. However, the game was not lost because of bad playing on the part of the home team, for the team did good work, but because of a decision of the umpire based on a play he failed to see.

Up to the seventh inning the game was intensely interesting, much quick work being done and both pitchers, especially Millis being in excellent form. Tillamook had started things off in the sixth when Eberman singled to center, stole second, took third on Armspiker's single to left, and scored on an error at home.

Van Wartwick started the fire works for the Weonas in the first of the seventh by sending a two base

drive into left, taking third on an error by Peterson in picking up McHail's grounder and scoring on and umpire decision. Both runners should have been out had the play been seen, for McHail who had advanced to second forced Van to try for home by running up on him at the time of Peterson's error.

Buster threw to third for a double and Van threw out his arm, striking the ball and throwing it to one side. However, this was not seen by the umpire and the runner was called safe when he scored before the ball could be regained. McHail, who had returned to second also scored on the decision. Two more runs, on errors by Buster and Spike, ended the excitement.

In the last of the seventh Gus Peterson scored for the club on an error at second, and in the 8th McHail again scored for the visitors on a wild heave by Millis. In the ninth Millis doubled to center, after Spike and Buster had struck out, and scored on a double by Rhodes. However, Gus Peterson failed to connect with the ball and the game ended.

Much credit is due to Millis, the pitcher for the home team, who heaved gilt edged ball throughout the game. Only three hits are registered against him, while he has thirteen strike outs to his credit six of them in succession. He also did good work with the stick, securing two hits out of four times up.

Tillamook received seven hits from Scott, the Weonas pitcher. The batteries were for the Weonas, Scott and Wentworth for Tillamook, Millis and Armbuster.
