NEW INCORPORATION OUTLINES WORK Hotel Will Cost \$70,000 At a meeting of the stockholders of the new hotel yesterday, which is to be erected on 3rd St. between Second and Third Avenues East, P. J. Worrell, E. J. Worrell and H. T. Botts were elected directors of the company. According to a clause in the by-laws, which were also adopted at this meeting, the directors have the power of electing the officers of the incorporation and they will do this as soon as they can get together. The stockholders incorporated about the middle of the week for \$33,000. The part of the building which is to be erected by them will only comprise about half of the entire project since the Tillamook County Bank will erect the part fronting on Second Avenue East. The cost of erecting the entire building will be over \$70,000. No plans have been adopted yet but according to those which have been proposed by the architects the hotel will be three stories high with a ten foot basement and will have between sixty and seventy rooms.
