This "jin" resembled the guillotine in construction and stood on a stone scaffold, unearthed when Gibbet hill was leveled. The ax is preserved. This, the only guillotine used in Eng land, was the forerunner of the "maiden," introduced into Scotland by Regent Morton and now in the Edinburgh Antiquarian museum. The "Hallfax gibbet" was last used in 1650 and the "maiden" for Lord Argyll in 1661 and his son in 1685, who spoke of it as the sweetest maiden be ever

Dr. Gaillotine did not invent the machine. Dr. Louis constructed one in 1791, the "Louison," but the name "guillotine" became general from the burst of surgical enthusiasm, in which Dr. Guillotine in 1789, after deploring the tedlous torture of hanging, ex claimed, "With my machine I strike off your head in the twinkling of an eye, and you never feel it!"-London

MEERSCHAUM MINING.

The Pits at Nemlau Have Been Worked For Twenty Centuries.

Meerschaum mines at Nemiau have been worked for 2,000 years, it is claimed, and the process is quite simple. The mines, which at one time reached from Kahe to Mihalitch, on the sea of Marmora, are concentrated around the city of Eski-Shehr and give employment to some 5,000 miners.

The mines are worked in the most primitive manner by a foreman and two to five workmen with picks. The depths of the pits vary greatly and depend upon the depth at which a red dish brown earth is met, which is the first indication of the existence of mag-

Sometimes this red earth is found only a few yards beneath the surface. but ordinarily at a depth of twenty yards, often forty and even sixty. In this layer or red earth meerschaum is found, disseminated in nuggets of ir regular shape. The size of these rarely exceeds tweive to sixteen cubic inches The greater part are of the size of a walnut. No explosives are used, the ground being soft.

The Deep Sea Lead.

In order to find a ship's position when approaching the land in a fog soundings are taken with the "deep sea lend." This lend weighs twenty eight pounds and is attached to a line which is marked off in fathoms by bunting of various colors, pieces of leather and knots. Bored in the base of the lead is a hole about two inches deep, and this is filled with tallow, so that the gravel or shells at the bottom will adhere to it, and the nature of the bed may be thus ascertained. When the lead is thrown overboard the water's depth is noted on the line, and this and the adherence to the tallow when compared with the description given on the chart will give the ship's position with tolerable accuracy.

A FAMOUS BEACON.

The Navesink Light, Near Sandy Hook, is a Wonder.

The most powerful light in America n housed on a promontory near Sandy Hook, 250 feet above the beach, where it acts as a safeguard to all ships entering or leaving the harbor of New York. It is called Navesink light and is of 95,000,000 candle power. At fifteen or twenty miles its flash is as pointed and brilliant as a star. On a perfectly clear night its shaft of light can be seen 100 miles at sea. When it was erected it was operated at twice its present candle power. But ocean pilots objected to its strength, saying that so amazing an electric dash actually blinded them and interfered with their work. The amount of oll consumed by the engine that provides the power for the light is only one gallon and seveneighths an hour. That is the astonishing thing to the unscientific visitorthe comparatively small expense and effort required to maintain so great a light. There are two fair sized dyna mos and two oil engines. One set is always kept in reserve. Of course the tremendous candle power is developed by means of a great lens, made in France. The lens weighs seven tons and a half, is seven inches thick and rests in mercury. It is revolved with ease.-Saturday Evening Post.
