The Warren Construction Co. started their rock crushing plant the first of the week. It is located east of town on the terminal grounds of the P. R. & N. Co. Two crushers are operated at the plant, one for small rock and the other for large rock. The rock is received from the quarry at Garibaldi.  
Mayor Harter informs us that the city council has made arrangements for a Portland firm to take up city warrants at par. There is no reason why they should be sold at a discount to the warrant sharks. The Mayor proposes to keep up the credit of the city as long as he is head boss of this municipality.  
W. C. Johnson, late of Alton, Mo., has leased the Todd Hotel for a period of two years. Mr. Johnson and wife are pleasant people and we feel that they will have a goodly patronage. Mr. Todd, owner of the hotel, states that he will remain in this city and rest up for a while and in the meantime look after his property here.  
About seventy excursionists from Portland arrived in Tillamook Tuesday on the special train. They boarded the yacht Bayocean and went to the Bayocean resort where they will make their headquarters. Wednesday afternoon the visitors came into this city for a few hours visit, afterwards returning to Bayocean. The excursion is merely for sight seeing and recreation on our famous beaches.  
Louis E. Morton vs. Mary Morton is a suit filed in the Circuit Court this week by Attorney John Leland Henderson. The plaintiff sets forth that his wife has not lived with him since some time last year and since leaving him has joined a movement in Los Angeles known as the "Pongues of Fire," which practices free love, and also that her political views were not as his. He therefore prays for divorce.  
Mrs. G. L. Dick left for Portland Sunday morning with her son Donald whom she is taking to that city to have his eye operated on. The latter part of last week while playing with his younger brother, Donald was struck in the eye accidentally with a stick. It was found that there was no help for the injury and the parents were advised that an operation, involving the removal of the eye, would be necessary.  
J. S. Beall, president of Beall & Co., was in this county with the Portland excursionists and came to this city Wednesday morning ahead of the excursion train and visited with R. W. Watson during the day. Although Mr. Beall has been in the machinery business in Portland for a number of years and has done an extensive business with this county in the way of selling machinery for road work, yet he has never seen the county until he came in on the excursion train Tuesday.

There will be a Union Temperance meeting of all the Churches of this city, in the M.E. Church, on Monday evening, June 30. The pastor of each church will take part. All are invited to come out and enjoy this, the first meeting of the kind since the Tillamook W.C.T.U. was organized.  
The members of the Progressor Class of the Methodist Church met at the home of Edwin Boquist Tuesday night and from there went to the Wilson River on the Whitney Company's land where they built a fire on the bank of the river and spent the evening playing games and having a general good time. Coffee was cooked on the fire and luncheon was served at twelve o'clock, after which the crowd departed for their homes. About twenty-five were present and all report having a good time.  
At a meeting of the City Council on Monday evening, with Mayor Harter and Councilmen Vantreas, Sappington, Knudson, Leach and Maddux present, it was decided to turn the street concessions to the Fourth of July Committee. A resolution was passed ordering the Warren Construction Company to live up to the street specifications and use crushed rock instead of gravel for curbs. The resolution also ordered that where curbing is made of gravel they are to be torn out. The City Council passed an ordinance to prohibit and punish disorderly conduct in the council chamber.  
According to the letters received from the "hikers" who went to the valley the first of last week, Mr. Soper will start on the return trip to this city with his bunch about Thursday. The boys won two of the base ball games which they played while out, the one with Willamina and the other with the team at the State Penitentiary. At Salem the boys were taken through the entire grounds belonging to the State and everything was explained thoroughly to them. Quite a few loving letters have been received by the parents of the boys stating, after saying how much they loved their mother and father, that they were "broke" and needed money.  
The Fire Department was called out at half past ten Monday evening to save Wolfe's blacksmith shop. At the time of discovery, the fire had burned a bad hole in the roof of the building and was making rapid headway in the dry shingles. The Hose Company did quick work and must be complimented on the way they handled the fire. Much trouble was caused, as usual, by people who are not firemen, giving orders. Perhaps these people do not realize that they lay themselves liable to a fine. However, in the future the company will try to have it so that only the orders from the captains will need to be observed. It seems that the fire started in the southeast corner of the shop from underneath.  
Arrangements are being made to secure the use of 100 acres of land for two weeks in July, for if this can be obtained it is more than probable that the Oregon National Guard will hold its annual encampment in Tillamook this year. The regiment is about 1000 strong, and should it be decided that the encampment be held here, it will be an interesting affair. Some of the members of the Tillamook Commercial Club have the matter in hand, and as soon as the land is obtained Adjt.-General Finzer will be advised, who will decide where the encampment is to be held after the different locations have been inspected. We understand that a location near this city is desired and would have preference over other locations.  
The Tillamook Commercial Club baseball team will play the Banks team next Sunday at the Gifford Stillwell Park. The visiting team is considered to be one of the fastest amateur teams in the lower Willamette valley and a fast and snappy game is expected. It is hoped that there will be more enthusiastic support at this game than there usually is. T. B. Handley has arranged to have the "Portland Cubs" here during the Fourth of July celebration. Games will be played at the Park each day from July third to seventh inclusive. The Cubs will come to this city greatly strengthened to what they were when here last year since the last game was played 2 to 1, it can be seen that the games will be worth seeing.
