

Tillamook Celebrates.

All Tillamook was astir on Wednesday morning getting ready for the Independence Day celebration which began at nine o'clock when America was played by the Tillamook Concert Band.

On Saturday the Celebration Committee received the following telegram from the California Aviation Company which fully explains why Aviator Francis did not make the flight on the Fourth:

San Francisco, June 28. Fourth of July Committee, Tillamook.

Our aviator instructed us that he had shipped his machine to your town and we found out this morning that he had not. He smashed up three days ago and was nearly killed. Could you change the date of your celebration to a later date so that it will give us a chance to send another man?

Upon the receipt of the above telegram the committee made arrangements with Manning Bros., of Portland, to secure one of their machines and an aviator. It was decided that Sy Christoferson, the man who made a successful flight from the roof of the Multnomah Hotel a few weeks ago, would come to this city and fly in a Curtis E. plane at 11 a. m. Wednesday.

However, the ground which had not been put in shape was so soft that sufficient speed could not be made to take the machine from the ground until the third trial and even then the attempt to fly was unsuccessful and the machine plunged to the ground, breaking one of the wings.

At 7 p. m. Mr. Christoferson made another attempt to fly but this also was a failure. Although some have said unkind things about the demonstration and the aviator, they should remember that he was not having the same success that he usually does and as many people present had never seen a mechanical bird before, the demonstration will be appreciated by them although a long flight was not made.

In the afternoon the first thing was the automobile parade which was composed of several very pretty floats of which Sheriff Crenshaw's was the best. There were over thirty autos altogether in the parade.

After this came the base ball game between Tillamook and the Studebaker team which was won by the home team 5 to 4. At 3:30 p. m. the sports including the catching of the greased pig, a sack race of 40 yards and a three legged race of 50 yards, occurred on 2nd Ave. East.

In the Fourth of July events which were pulled off Thursday the most interesting by far was the ball game of the afternoon. The recitation of the Declaration of Independence by John Leland Henderson and the Address by Dr. C. H. Chapman, of the Oregonian, were both well received by the immense throng of people which were gathered about the speakers' platform.

After lunch, the parade which was one of the best and by far the most unique ever given in Tillamook. The parade was headed by twenty two girls dressed in white and wearing yellow caps and aprons, representing the dairy maids; after them came a number of men supposed to be cheese-makers but having more the appearance of clowns. They were dressed in green and wore on their heads imitation cheese. In the rear were the floats representing the many business houses of the city. Of these the float of Halton's took first place and showed much pains and ability for decorating.

There was very little competition in the sports of the afternoon. Ernest Therdich took first on the greased pole performance and Hubert Melchoir and Therdich tied for high dive. It was impossible to have the tub race so a long swim was substituted which was won by James Smith.

The base ball game was close all through and interest died down at no time until the last man at the bat for the Studebaker's and one of their heaviest hitters was struck out by Millia, and Tillamook had won the second game of the series by a 3 to 2 score. The games have been well attended and the Club is thoroughly pleased with having furnished games that kept the spectators interested.

THE HIKERS RETURN.

Twenty-Three Young Men Had Pleasant Time on Trip.

The hiking party of twenty-three young men from the Loyal Sons class of the Christian Church returned to this city last Sunday morning at half an hour past midnight. The word "tired" was written in every feature, but altho the last of the trip seemed rather hard to some still they are not sorry that the hike was made.

From this city the walkers were taken to Hebo in autos and from there they walked to Sheridan. At Willamina they were supposed to play base ball but were unable to do so. However, in Sheridan they found a team ready for them and after they had been given a reception upon the eve of their arrival in that city the boys felt themselves prepared to take defeat into the supposed Sheridan High School team. Clent King had the measles and was unable to pitch, so Bruce Hare was placed in the box for the travelers. Although the game resulted in a 5 to 3 defeat for our boys they did not feel so had when they found out that there was only one High School boy in the team and that he played with the regular Sheridan team. At least they feel confident that had Clent pitched, victory would have been theirs.

From Sheridan the boys went to Salem through Balston and McCoy by conveyance, owing to the muddy condition of the roads. Here they played the Loyal Sons Class or in fact the Y. M. C. A. team of Salem and were again defeated 4 to 2.

The boys report that Salem surely knows how to entertain, for they were given a royal reception and were taken over the entire city, through the State Institutions of Reform and the public buildings and through the Y. M. C. A. building. At the last place they were told they might use the swimming tank and of course they were too timid to refuse. The last game played in Salem was with the convicts at the State penitentiary.

After leaving Salem Mr. Jope took the boys to the Sunday School Convention at Turner where they spent a few days during which time they defeated the preachers in a base ball game 8 to 2. They then played at Turner defeating them 3 to 2. In this game King struck out nineteen men and would have had a shut out game had it not been for a wild throw by Stam in the last inning.

The return trip was then started, which took them through Dallas, Buell, Willamina and over the Jones Trail through Blaine and Beaver into Tillamook. At Blaine they were met by Drew Dawson who brought them to town. All of those starting the hike returned with the bunch except Floyd Eberman and Don Newman who went to Portland from Salem, Gail Buell who stayed in Salem for a short visit, Bruce Wade who went to Falls City to visit and Leslie Harrison who just had to come on home ahead of the boys because he was so very homesick, don't you know.

According to all reports the day spent at the Penitentiary was one filled with more pleasure and profitable sight seeing than any other of the entire time. It is an unusual thing for a crowd of boys to be given the privileges of the prison grounds that the hikers were given, and it is not very often that a strange baseball team is permitted to play their team.

It was Saturday when the boys were taken to the grounds and as the convicts have no work to do on that day they were all sitting on the inside of the wall ready for the gate to be opened and the Tillamook boys to enter. As the guard ushered the boys on the ground a cheer arose that made Mr. Jope's aggregation feel quite welcome.

Of course the game was of most importance and every one seemed to think so. According to the warden the convicts had their whole week's allowance of tobacco and everything else that they could put up on the outcome of the game. This gave the visitors a large number of rooters, for those who had bet on Tillamook were making all the noise that they could to help them win. The prison team were dressed in blue and white uniforms and made a fine appearance on the diamond. Their pitcher McClure, an ex-Multnomah Club man, did good work, but was not enough for the hikers, and their catcher, Lewis, a big husky negro, one of the heaviest hitters on the team is reported as being an excellent man behind the bat. For all his batting ability King allowed him one hit. The line up for this game was:

The boys feel very proud because they defeated this team since it has defeated nearly every team around Salem including the Willamette University nine.

Banks Was Badly Licked.

At the beginning of the seventh Newell was sent in to finish the game for the visitors but he, too, was found for three runs and four hits in three innings.

Tillamook played a steady game throughout, there being only two errors charged to her. The main features of the game were the heavy hitting of the home team, especially Eberman, Peterson, Millis and Tuerck and the pitching of Millis who struck out thirteen men and allowed only three hits.

The Banks team is considered one of the strongest teams among the lower Willamette Valley amateur teams and their defeat by the home squad puts our team high in its class.
