A. K. Hill, of the National Milk tion. Sugar Co., of New York, is in the 500 g city looking into the matter of establishing a plant in this vicinity for the purpose of converting whey into milk sugar in the crude form. Mr. Hill states that the plant for this purpose will cost about \$20,000 equipped. It is proposed to pay the farmers the same price for the whey that they can make if it were fed to the hogs. Ma. Hill met with the water com

mission Monday evening and dis-cussed the matter of obtaining sufficient water from them to run the plant. It was stated that the plant would use 500 gallons of water per minute for ten hours of every day. It is thought that the water can be supplied without any


