The mail boat Henrietta No. 2 was made about two hours late Sunday afternoon by repairs having to be made on her engine. While returning from her morning trip the pump broke and the engine became so hot that Capt. Jenkins had to be towed into port by a fishing boat. The break was so serious that a new pump had to be put in before the afternoon trip could be made.

One of the finest strings of trout that we have seen this season was brought into town Sunday by Dr. J. E. Reedy and Dr. John Olson. The two men and their wives spent the day on the upper Trask where it seems that the trout were biting unusually good, for when they returned to town in the evening, there were fifty-four trout, averaging about ten inches or over in length included in their string.

The yacht Bayocean was slightly damaged Saturday evening when she was backed into the Bayocean dock, breaking off the aft railing and tearing down the awning roof to the open air saloon. The boat also broke a piling from underneath the Bayocean dock. The yacht was just returning from Garibaldi where she had been to get the passengers from the Saturday evening special when the accident occurred.

G. L. Dick returned from Portland Sunday and reports that his son Donald, whose eye was removed the latter part of the week, is getting along as nicely as can be expected. There were two small slivers in the back part of the eye ball which were working toward the brain and which made it necessary for the operation to be performed. Had the eye not been removed when it was it is very probable that the accident might have proved fatal.

Rollie W. Watson closed a deal Tuesday to sell what will be known as the Stillwell Park Addition to Tillamook. This property lies on the North side of the Stillwell Park and joins the Maple Grove Addition. There will be about thirty lots of the Stillwell Park Addition, each lot being 50 x 100 feet with a ten foot alley through the block. Water is already furnished to this property through a six inch main. Mr. Watson will place the lots on sale on the installment plan.

An attractive feature of the Sunday night concert at Bayocean was the vocal recital given by H. I. Bowles, of Portland, assisted by the hotel orchestra under the direction of Professor von Jessen. Mr. Bowles sang a suite of songs by Arthur Foote, several Old English Ballads and by request several modern songs. Mr. Klein rendered a violin solo and Mr. Brown, a piano solo. The rendition of the famous Scherzini minuet, by Prof. von Jessen, was a feature of the programme.

Practically all of those from here who attended the Elks' Convention at Portland this year returned the last of the week and they all state that they had the best time of their lives. It seems that there was exceptionally good order maintained on the streets of the Carnival city and every one was kept busy doing the things which the hosts had planned for the week of celebration. The whole program was carried out with hardly a break. The Astoria lodge, of which the Tillamook Elks are members, won second prize in the parade.

A resolution was passed at the regular council meeting last Monday evening requiring that the telephone and electric light poles which are located at the intersection of streets be placed within the curb and also within the continuation of the property lines. According to the resolution all poles not in conformity with the requirements are to be removed within ten days. This resolution is making considerable trouble in the changing of poles and especially at Halton's corner there is a pole which has made it necessary to cut two holes in the concrete walk near the corner of the block. It has not been decided as yet where the pole will be located.

President Shrode, of the Tillamook Commercial Club, received a message from Adj. Gen. W. E. Finzer the last of the week in which it was stated that the Oregon regiment would not make encampment in this county this year, because of orders having been received from Washington, D. C., to the effect that the Oregon regiment would meet in joint encampment with the Washington and Idaho troops at Grays Harbor, Washington, this year. Gen. Finzer stated that it was his opinion that the Oregon Guard would encamp in this county next summer for their yearly maneuvers and outing.

The cases against Jeff Fleck and Ben Via for intimidating an officer and against Henry Brooten for assault with a dangerous weapon were tried in Justice Stanley's court on Saturday. The case against Fleck was dismissed because of insufficient evidence. Brooten and Via were each bound over to the grand jury on \$250 bonds. It was hard to determine which of the two witnesses was telling the truest story, but it seems that both Fleck and Via hit Deputy Sheriff Edmunds and that the stabbing of Fleck by Brooten was more than likely an accident, although one or two of the witnesses stated that Brooten struck at Fleck twice with the knife.

The passenger traffic has increased so rapidly within the past two weeks that the Southern Pacific Company has increased the number of coaches from two to four on the regular run, and all of these are filled to their capacity each evening. A number of changes have been made in the office in this city within the past month, until at present the force is entirely different from what it was at that time. The freight business of the road has increased since the first of the year so that an additional man has been placed in the office. The force at present includes A. H. Gaylor, agent; S. L. Smith, operator; Bert Byers, freight clerk; E. Gaylor, express clerk; and W. E. Anderson, baggage clerk.

The Whitney Company, Ltd., placed their fire wardens last week because of the dry condition of the moss and dead timber in the forest. The wardens and their locations are as follows: Edgar Munson, Chief, Tillamook; Herbert Parsons, Miami; Claude Webb, Kelchis; John Wilson, Upper Kelchis; William Timmeret, Wilson River; Hull Johnson, Bewley Creek; and George Vaughn, Fossett Creek. The Whitney Company is doing a good deal of work in this county this summer. All of their timber will be cruised before the end of the summer, and there is a large force of men working at this at the present time. Russell Hawkins, the head of the Company, is having a residence built on their property on the bay, at present for a summer home.
