

A "GET TOGETHER" SPIRIT PREVAILED.

Strong Organization to be Formed to Boost the Entire County.

"Get together and work together for the entire county" was the sentiment which prevailed at the "Get together" meeting at the Tillamook Commercial Club rooms on Thursday, the result of which is an effort will now be put forth to bring all commercial clubs and other organizations under one head for publicity work and for the development of all sections of the county. The idea is to get together, pull together, push together and boost the county together. Nehalem was represented by some of its leading and progressive citizens and Bay City had a good representation of live wires, with a slogan, "Here to boost, pull and push." Every speaker was in hearty accord with the movement to "Get together and work together" for the up-building of the entire county, the only difference of opinion being as to whether it should be a league of commercial clubs in Tillamook County, or whether other organizations, such as the Granges, should be invited to co-operate in the organization. The latter idea prevailed, and to set the ball rolling each club and organization will be entitled to two representatives on the committee which will submit a constitution and plans upon which to form a permanent organization, and when this is arranged a big "Get together" meeting will be held in this city.

In response to a call issued by the Tillamook Commercial Club, a number of members of the commercial clubs and other organizations of the county met at the Tillamook Commercial Club rooms on Thursday evening, August 8, for the purpose of discussing methods of bringing the various sections of this county more closely in touch with each other and of "getting together" on matters pertaining to the entire county. President D. L. Shrode, of the Tillamook Commercial Club, acted as chairman of the meeting and E. J. Claussen, of the same body, as secretary.

Mr. Shrode, in opening, announced the purpose of the call, and short addresses voicing the sentiment of the different parts of the county and urging the organization of a county league were made by the following gentlemen:

It was thereupon moved by Mr. Bozorth that it is the sense of the meeting that we organize a Tillamook County Development League to look after the general interests of the county. The motion was seconded by Mr. Henderson. Motion carried.

Mr. Gersoni suggested that the organization follow the lines of the Oregon Development League, i. e., that is be a representative body composed of delegates chosen by the commercial clubs, granges, cheese factories and other industries of the county rather than of individual members.

Mr. Henderson voiced a similar idea. Mr. Willett urged that the organization be made broad enough to include persons not now members of any organized body.

It was moved by Mr. Henderson that it is the sense of the meeting that the organization be composed of members of commercial clubs, granges, cheese factories and other industries or bodies that are now, or may hereafter be organized. The motion was seconded by Dr. Hawk. Motion carried.

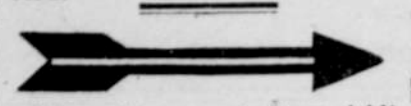
A substitute motion was offered by Mr. Willett that the matter of organization be referred to a committee of five, to be appointed by the chair, who shall investigate the matter and recommend plans at a later meeting. Motion was duly seconded. An amendment was offered that each organized body of the county be

requested to appoint two members to act on this committee was accepted by Mr. Willett and his second and the motion, as amended was carried.

It was moved by Mr. Watson that a copy of these proceedings be sent to each organization in the county with an invitation to appoint two members for the committee on organization and that notice hereof be published in the newspapers. Motion was duly seconded and carried.

It was moved and seconded that the committee on organization be requested to meet at the Tillamook Commercial Club rooms on Wednesday, August 21, 1912, at 8 p. m. Motion carried.

It was moved and seconded to adjourn, subject to the call of the chairman. Motion carried.

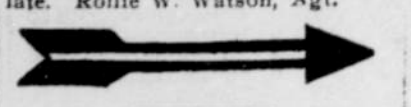

IDAHO FALLS IN LINE

Joins the Procession of Progressive cities that favor Bitulithic Pavement.

City Council awards contract for pavement of the Idaho city with Bitulithic Pavement.

Owing to the magnitude of the award for paving the streets of Idaho Falls that has been pending for some time past, the interest in the final result has been widespread.

All the friends of first quality and economy in the long run will be glad to learn that the contract at Idaho Falls was let to the Warren Company of Portland, and that the Falls city streets will be paved with bitulithic.

The council took this action first because the taxpayers of Idaho Falls seemed to prefer bitulithic and secondly because, after thoroughly investigating the record of bitulithic in cities where it has been tried for more than ten years the council committee found bitulithic to be preferable from every point of view.

BOARDED AN ICEBERG.

The Floating Island That Wrecked a Ship Saved Its Crew.

Curious indeed was the experience of the crew of the German ship Hansa with an iceberg. The Hansa struck an ice island in latitude 52 degrees a little before midnight in a freezing gale. The impact carried her bow far up on the berg and imbedded it firmly in the ice. Her back was broken by the force of the collision and before morning was wrenched away from the forward part by the battering seas and sank.

When the Hansa struck the boats were lowered, but only one escaped being swamped after pulling away from the doomed ship. It was soon found, however, that this boat was leaking and that no amount of bailing would keep it afloat more than a few hours, so the mate in command of it made for the berg and succeeded in climbing up on it to a place of temporary safety. From the broken timbers of the Hansa's bow the castaways built a rude shelter and snared sea birds to eke out the scanty supplies they had been able to save from the ship.

As the ice island drifted farther south into warmer waters and began perceptibly to shrink the shipwrecked men were a prey to constant fear that the melting mass might turn turtle any time and precipitate them all in the sea, from which it had so providentially saved them. Also they feared it might "calve" and the part breaking away from the main bulk might carry them with it to destruction. The constant grinding and groaning of the great ice raft filled their hearts with constant terror, and the deserted seas added to their despair.

But the berg held together for eight months, and the Hansa's men traveled 750 miles before they were finally picked up in latitude 41 degrees, suffering from frostbites and hunger, but otherwise no worse for their long exposure.—New York Press.

WEST POINT CADETS.

Their Education Costs the Government About \$3,500 Each.

The selection of West Point as the place for the National Military academy was due to its advantages from a military viewpoint, for its rugged beauty and its severe climate were calculated to be beneficial in the formation of that sort of character so essential to a successful officer.

The academy was formally opened on July 4, 1802, with ten cadets and five officers as instructors. Its success is said to be due to the administrative ability of General Sylvanus Thayer, who became its superintendent in 1817 and served as such for sixteen years. This officer is known as the "father of West Point."

A cadet's education costs the government about \$3,500. All cadets are on the same footing. The pay of a cadet is \$600 per year and one ration per day or commutation thereof at 30 cents per day. The total is about \$709.50, to commence with his admission to the academy. Immediately after his admission the young man must spend \$160 for uniforms.

After graduation the cadet is eligible to the rank of second lieutenant and is appointed to whatever branch of the service his record entitles him. Those who are highest in class honors are generally appointed to the engineer corps.—Leslie's.
