Some months ago it was proposed to pay them 8c. per 100 pounds, but those who are interested in starting a factory are only willing to pay 5c. per 100 pounds with a fifteen years' contract.

The case of P. McIntosh vs. Alex. McNair, which was a case appealed from Multnomah county to the Supreme Court in which the plaintiff sued for money, a decision was rendered in favor of McNair. This is the second time that the case was tried. First it was tried in Tillamook County and then taken to the Supreme Court, where Mr. McNair won out. Having obtained service on Mr. McNair in Portland the case was retried in Multnomah county and then appealed to the Supreme Court, the decision being again in favor of Mr. McNair. NEW TRAIN SERVICE.

Two Daily Local Trains Between Tillamook and Mohler.

Agent Gaylord, of the P. R. & R., has been notified that a daily service between Tillamook City and Mohler will be established next Sunday, the railroad running two local trains between these two points. This was at the request of the Tillamook Commercial Club, which circulated a petition and forwarded it to the railroad company.

Depot Badly Needed.

The business men and the traveling public are now becoming interested in the building of a depot, for the last few days of wet weather made it exceedingly disagreeable for those who travel and have business with the P. R. & N. It is now nine months since train service was started. Probably the matter of the building of depot was delayed on account of the railroad changing their plans, but it is hoped by the business men that the railroad company will give Tillamook City a depot as soon as possible. Bitulithic pavement is now laid to the city limits and it is the intention of the County Court to have the small stretch of road between the city limits and the depot grounds paved, which will make it quite convenient for the traveling public. The Executive Board of the Tillamook Commercial Club will take the matter up with the railroad, and as this is the now the most important business center with the prospects of a rapid growth, no doubt the P. R. & N. will erect a depot which will be a credit to the company and the city.
