Tillamook City is just beginning to put on metropolitan airs with the completion of the first few blocks of hard surfaced roads, and when the contract of sixty blocks is finished this fall the city will have an up-to-date appearance.

It may not be on an elaborate affair, but as a starter in a small way it will be appreciated because home talent, home industry and home products will be the leading features. Everybody help boost the Industrial and Floral Fair at Nehalem and try and be present so as to encourage the good people in the north end of the county in their commendable effort in having a yearly local fair. We predict that before many years roll round there will be a demand for hard surfaced roads for the main thoroughfares throughout the county. This is one of the most progressive counties in the state for road improvements, and we expect to see Tillamook county in the lead whenever a move in that direction is made. The County Court have the right idea, and that is to allow some of the paving concerns to lay a piece of hard surfaced road by way of an experiment, and with that object in view the Warren Construction Co. has offered to lay a piece of hard surfaced road from the city limits east to the depot grounds with a bitulithic pavement, which would be suitable for county roads. If there are other concerns which want to lay a piece of road to demonstrate the quality of their pavement by all means allow them to do so, for this will create competition. Most of the dairymen, before many years, will be driving autos for business and pleasure, and they will be the biggest boosters for hard surfaced roads. Suppose, for instance, Tillamook county had a road of that description from Dolph to the county line at Nehalem, the fame of Tillamook's splendid trunk and scenic road would be advertised all over the United States. The snap man expect to live long enough to see this hard surfaced road built in sections by contract, and in the meantime boost to help bring about, notwithstanding that some of our political friends, who imagine they have all the progressive ideas crammed into their own craniums, call us a standpatter.

The snap shot man was asked to take an active part in the organization of a Roosevelt club for this city and county. Having registered as a Republican and taken part in a Republican primary, the editor thinks that, if there is any honor in politics, that he should support the county, state and national tickets, and not "bolt" or attempt to defeat the Republican party simply because one man did not obtain the national nomination. Without any personal feeling in the matter, we look at the situation like this: Had Roosevelt secured the nomination he would now be appealing to the G.O.P. to support him for president, but having failed to do so, he and his followers are now endeavoring to defeat the party. That is not giving the Republican party a "square deal," as every fair minded and conscientious person must admit, especially those who registered and took part in the primary election as Republicans. Some people won't play fair in politics—unless they can have their own way and become the dictators of the Republican party. We cannot see any good reason why the Republican party, which has done so much for the development and progress of the United States, should be dumped overboard because Roosevelt was not nominated for president. So we decline to take part in any movement that will help defeat the G.O.P. and the tickets that were put up by that party. To be consistent and honest, there is no other course for us to follow, as we view the situation in this neck of the woods.

The "Get Together" meeting of the Commercial Clubs last

is the time for united effort in that direction to induce home seekers and new industries to locate in the county. Commercial clubs in other places of the Northwest are obtaining results, and to obtain the same results in this county the commercial clubs will have to show more hustle in the future than in the past. Each club may have its social features, but no club will amount to much if it turns its attention to social functions and neglects the most important work for which they are organized, viz., that of advertising and boosting their respective localities. It is true that the Tillamook Commercial Club have devoted considerable attention for the entertainment of its member, which was the proper thing to do, for this brought the business men together. Having been successful in one feature, let the good work progress along publicity lines. And to make it successful there must be a publicity fund and a manager at the head to boost the county. We hope this will be the object the commercial clubs have in view in getting together, and we appeal to our progressive citizens and business men in all parts of the county to lend their helping hand in a united effort to help boost the entire county, and as soon as this is done the population and pay rolls will increase.

At the last national election the Republican party was ahead of any other by over a million and a quarter votes, and ahead in the electoral vote by nearly two to one. Its total was over 7,600,000, and more than ever before. At no election since has a full vote polled, and consequently the general attitude has not been definitely ascertained. On the face of past national elections the country is strongly Republican. What is called a progressive element has sprung up in the party since 1908, and showed considerable strength in 1909 and 1910. It is expected to assert itself actively in the campaign of this year, but to keep inside the party lines. Bolting was not a part of its programme. But Col. Roosevelt suddenly pushed it aside presenting himself personally and a third term as the paramount issue. Defeated in the national convention he is now organizing a third party open on equal terms to Democrats and Republicans, and it would denounce alike both the old leading parties. It is no wonder that protesting Republicans like Senator La Follette look upon the budding of Col. Roosevelt as an insolent display of egotism and indifference to the rights of others. He is not the originator of the so-called progressive movement. He was supposed to mean what he said when he announced that he would not be a candidate for a third term. Now he asks both Republicans and Democrats to desert their party and support him for a third term. Progressive Republicans he fancies will flock to him anyway.
