At the last national election the Republican party was ahead of any other by over a million and a quarter votes, and ahead in the electoral vote by nearly two to one. Its total was over 7,600,000, and more than ever before. At no election since has a full vote polled, and consequently the general, attitude has not been definitely ascertained. On the face of past national elections the country is strongly Republican. What is called a progressive element has sprung up in the party since 1908, and showed considerable strength in 1909 and 1910. It is expected to assert itself actively in the compaign of this year, but to keep inside the party lines. Bolting was not a part of its programme. But Col. Roosevelt suddenly pushed it aside presenting himself personally and a third term as the paramount issue. Defeated in the national convention he is now organizing a third party open on equal terms to Democrats and Republicians, and it would denounce alike both the old leading parties. It is no wonder that protesting Republicans like Senator La Follette look upon the buttingin of Col. Roosevelt as an insolent display of egotism and indifference to the rights of others. He is not the originator of the so-called prothe G.O.P. and the tickets that gressive movement.
