George H. Himes, assistant secretary and curator of the Oregon Historical Society and secretary of the Oregon Pioneer Association; Captain W. H. Pope, a Columbia River pilot and W. P. Pope, were in the city on Saturday.

A large number of Tillamook people will leave next week to attend the State Fair, which commences on Monday, at Salem. The Southern Pacific will issue cheap rate tickets on the P. R. & N., the rate being one and one third fare.

Rural Mail Carrier Merrill Smith is taking a 15 days' vacation, which is given to rural mail carriers under the civil service rules, his pay going on the same. Mrs. Smith is the deputy and is carrying the mail and occasionally she takes her husband along for the benefit of his health.

W. B. Dennis and wife were in the city last week. Mr. Dennis is the vice-president and manager of the Carlton & Coast Railroad Company, and came over to meet Russell Hawkins of the Whitney Co. He informs us that his company expects to build down the Trask River before a great while.

The base ball game on Sunday between Sheridan and Tillamook resulted in favor of the visitors, the score being 4 to 3. This is the third game the home team played with Sheridan, and notwithstanding their success with other teams, the Sheridan boys won three straight victories.

The Executive Board of the Tillamook Commercial Club will send a resolution to the Southern Pacific requesting that immediate steps be taken in the erection of a depot, as it will be a great inconvenience to the traveling public to have to remain out in the open waiting for trains in the wet weather.

A special election will take place on Saturday to annex additional territory to the Port of Bay City, but only those who reside within the territory to be annexed and that already in the Port of Bay City, will be allowed to vote, which is included in the Tillamook, Hoquartion, Fairview, Bay, Foley and Garibaldi precincts.

About 700,000 young fish managed to get away from the Trask river hatchery during the recent raise in the river. They were large enough to take care of themselves. Sol Wheeler, who has charge of the hatchery, and Ed Leach planted 60,000 young salmon in the Salmonberry river, 20,000 in the Kelchis river and 20,000 in the Nestucca river.

A special meeting of the school district was held on Tuesday and Burr Beals was elected clerk in the

place of Alva Finley, who had resigned. It was decided to buy a school site in the new territory added to this district, and to avoid building a school house at the Ruger place this year, arrangements have been made to convey the three pupils to school in this city.

E. F. Lamson has just sold to A. R. Ford 30 head of beef cattle for \$60 per head. This is the record price ever paid for beef cattle in this section of the country. Mr. Lamson says that he sold the same kind of cattle during Cleveland's administration for \$15 per head and was glad to get it. Is it any wonder that Mr. Lamson is a thorough republican and a Taft man.—Willamina Times.

There is a good interest shown in the Holiness Camp Meeting now being held in Tillamook. Evangelist Harry Joseph Elliott will preach twice each day at 2 p. m. and 8 p. m. excepting Monday and Saturday afternoons. Some of the subjects for this week will be "Christian Perfection," "Holiness," "The two Baptisms," "The Double Minded Man," "Sanctification as a second work of Grace," "Sowing and Reaping," "Hell," "Heaven."

Quite a number of Tillamookers are camping on the beaches this season and on Sundays the trains are crowded with passengers who go to the beaches to enjoy the day. There was a large crowd at Bar View on Sunday, where there is fine bathing, open air dancing and other enjoyable features. The incoming trains always bring large crowds of pleasure seekers from the outside and the rooms seem to be taken as soon as vacated.

New Corporations.

Incorporation papers have been filed of the Nestucca Valley Bank, which is to be established at Cloverdale, the incorporators being W. J. Logus, Walter H. Evans and Jos. M. Reig. The capital stock will be \$15,000, backed by Portland and Tillamook people. This will give those who reside in the south end of the county an opportunity to do their banking in their own vicinity.

Articles of incorporation of the Neskwon Dairy Association, with \$2,000 capital stock, have been filed with Joseph Au'dermuer, Nick laus Afolter, James W. Myers and Joseph Kodak incorporators.

Articles of incorporation of the Mohler Mercantile Co. have been filed with Alva Finley, E. E. Finley and T. H. Goynne incorporators. The capital stock is placed at \$25,000.

Articles of incorporation of the Tillamook Co. Operative Fish Company have been filed with a capital stock of \$20,000. The incorporators are J. H. Hathaway, W. O. Chase and R. Blaine Hays.

Articles of incorporation of the Masonic Building Association of Tillamook have been filed, which is capitalized for \$10,000 divided into four hundred shares of the value of \$25.00 each, with Chas. L. Clough, C. W. Talmage, M. F. Leach, S. Viereck and George Willett incorporators. It is the intention of the association to build a Masonic temple next year on the lots recently bought from that purpose on Second street.

BAY GETS 7 LIGHTS.

Appropriation By Congress to Aid Tillamook Shore--Site Already Chosen.

If success that attended efforts of Tillamook Bay commercial interests in the past to obtain needed aids to navigation in that main way has been obliterated, for Henry L. Beck, inspector of the 17th lighthouse district, announced Monday that as Congress has passed the appropriation bill, seven post lights would be established on Tillamook Bay as soon as practicable.

He has located them on the map and the nearest to Tillamook City proper will be the Dry Stocking light. One will be placed at Dick point, the third at Long Jetty, fourth on the north side of the Bay City cutoff, the fifth near Hobsonville and the sixth on the wharf at Garibaldi while the seventh will be the main channel light, shown from a dolphin, on the southerly side of the entrance to the main road. Over a year ago Tillamook residents and mariners sought to have more aids established than have been doing duty, but though recommendations were made at Washington, the authorities there turned down the project.

PULLMAN JOINS THE PROCESSION.

Gets in Line With Progressive Cities That are Using Bitulithic Paving.

Pullman, Washington, has given notice to the world that it is for progress and that her citizens are enterprising by awarding a contract for paving her streets with bitulithic.

The city council of Pullman has for a long time been considering the demand of taxpayers that the streets be hardsurfaced, and after various trips of inspection to cities that are using bitulithic, Hassam, Dolarway, Concrete, Bitumas, Asphalt and other kinds of hardsurface paving, the council finally decided unanimously in favor of bitulithic as the best and also cheapest in the long run.

To Teachers and Pupils:
 Eight Grade Examinations Sept. 6 and 6, at the County Court Room, Tillamook City. All applicants wishing to complete the examinations so as to take up 9th Grade work, should present themselves at the above stated dates.

PROGRAM.

Thursday Sept. 5th, Physiology, Geography, History and Civil Government.

Friday Sept. 6, Grammar, Spelling, Arithmetic and Writing.

Teachers are obliged to satisfy the School Superintendent that they have done the Reading required under the "Reading Circle Act," before the certificates may be registered. In order to register contracts the certificates should be registered. That time may be saved we have decided to prepare questions of test from the different books required read, and hold these tests at stated times. Saturday Sept. 14, one will be given at the County Court Room, Tillamook City. We hope to make arrangements for holding these tests in different parts of the county so as not to place the Teachers to much inconvenience in attending them.

The books required are: Civics and Health, Allen; The American Rural Schools, Fought; How to Study, McMurry; The Teaching of English, Chubb. The above books may be had at my office. All parties wishing to read same may call and do so without being compelled to purchase them. We have only a limited number, hence we have limited the time for which the books may be kept from the office.

Owing to the requirements of this law being new to the teachers of Oregon, leniency will be extended until an opportunity has been given for every one to take the test as stated above.

However the contracts will be retained in this office until we are satisfied that the required reading has been done.
