Editorial Snap Shots.

We noticed one young fellow at Nehalem on Saturday who was a booster, even if he was feeling a little hilarious and good natured, he boosted for the home band.

Don't have the bad reputation of being a bolter from either the Republican or Democratic party for the purpose of riding in the bolters' band wagon for a few short months.

The Bull Moose party will be a political hoodoo to a good many persons, for they will always afterwards bear the earmarks of attempting to bust up the Republican party.

When it came to judging babies at Nehalem on Saturday Henry Tohl threw up his hands and swore off. Had one of the infant talking machines attempted to expand its lungs in Henry's ears?

The Bull Moose meeting in this next Saturday is for the purpose of lending a helping hand to bust up the Republican party, and, of course, Democrats are urging and advising the Bull Moosers to organize and place candidates in the field.

If it is necessary to boost the county by advertising it is also equally necessary to boost ones business. Whenever a stranger comes to the city with anything to sell, the first thing he does is to hunt up the newspapers. Why? Because he knows that it pays to advertise.

It is no wonder that a large proportion of business men and the manufacturers are for Taft, for they know that he is a safe man at the head of the country, and that the country will be prosperous if he is re-elected. They don't propose to take any chances, and that is the reason they are becoming bigger boosters for President Taft every day.

Our local Bull Moosers have compared Roosevelt and Johnson to "Dreadnoughts." If we know anything about dreadnoughts they are built for destructive purposes and when in commission are loaded with explosives. No one now doubts but what Roosevelt and Johnson are loaded with a whole lot of explosives to destroy the Republican party and overthrow constitutional government.

It was a college professor, Seth Lowe, who was elected mayor to administer and clean up New York city. When he was placed in harness and had to buck up against the hard problems of city government, his theories all fell to pieces and his administration was a gigantic failure. Candidate Wilson is also a college professor and filled up with theory, while Taft is a practical man and knows how to handle difficult problems in a practical manner from long experience and thoughtful study.

There is little or no difference between the old Tillamook rule or ruin faction and the Bull Moosers. As long as the rule or ruin faction could dominate the Republican party of this county, name, elect and control officials they remained regular Republicans, but as soon as the people revolted at these methods and nominated candidates who could not be controlled, then the rule and ruin faction, headed by

disgruntled office seekers, were the first to make a fight upon and defeat the Republican candidates and Republican party. Roosevelt and his followers have adopted exactly the same rule or ruin policy.

The business men should devote more time and take more interest in the commercial club of this city, for a live commercial club means a live business city, and just the opposite when business men become inactive and take little or no interest in the commercial club. From years of experience we know that people in Tillamook have a tendency to take hold of a proposition with a vim and then loose interest. Climatic conditions may have something to do with that. But we contend that every business man ought to take enough interest in the welfare of the city to devote one evening a month to help boost it. Every monthly meeting of the club should be a boosters' gathering, and every business man, without any exception, should be present and help to boost for their own town, and not stand back and reap the benefits of those who are giving their time and footing the bills in their efforts to make this a live, prosperous, business city.

Governor West has jumped into the reform band wagon and says he is going to clean up the city of Portland of vice. But suppose he does succeed in running out a large number of prostitutes from that city other parts of Oregon will be infested with them. Driving these unfortunate women from one place to another only adds to the hard lives they are living. Instead of driving them out like so many cattle is not a solution to the social purity question, and spasmodic attempts to reform these unfortunates in that way have always ended in failure. If these women are to be reformed at all it is by kindness and not harsh treatment—taking them into rescue homes and private families. But what about the men who lead innocent girls astray, causing deep sorrow in the homes, and the men who use women to satisfy their own passions? It is easy to find people who want to drive unfortunate women from a large city into the rural towns, but very few who will lend a helping hand to provide homes for them.

Populism is outdistanced by Roosevelt and his followers; in fact, some of the things the Bull Moosers advocates is Populism gone crazy. For instance, Roosevelt want judicial decisions referred to the people. It is a surprise to us how an intelligent citizen, and especially an attorney, can advocate such tommyrot. It is a common expression amongst attorneys that they never know what a jury is doing to do after hearing the evidence and the argument in a case. Under the Bull Moose system every attorney who received a reverse decision in a case would have it referred to a vote of the people, which would mean that at every state election people would be called upon to vote and decide the cases brought in the courts of Oregon for two years, for every attorney who is defeated in a case will hang on to it with the hope that the people, who know nothing about the evidence or the law, will reverse the court's decision. We think most every well balanced and sensible person will agree with us that this is Populism gone crazy and is worse than socialism.

The public school children of Tillamook county did not take to raising vegetables as they should certainly have done, but a few enthusiasts did so and they are to be commended for the success which attended their efforts. We hear a great deal about the high cost of living, and one way to help reduce this is for each family in the county to raise their own garden truck, chicken, eggs, small fruits, etc. It is to be hoped that renewed effort will be made next year to induce the young folks to raise these home products, and as a greater stimulus to this it should be known that a county fair will be held in Tillamook City and that valuable prizes given to those who made the best display. One county fair would do more good and cause greater satisfaction than a dozen Fourth of July celebrations, when most of the money goes for "outside attractions." As Fairview and

Nehalem districts have taken a lead in this matter, and they are to be commended for doing so, the Tillamook Commercial Club should decide to hold a county fair next year, so that home products from all parts of the county could be exhibited. We hope to see the "Get Together" spirit take up the matter of a county fair for next year.

Most every day people drive into Tillamook in autos with the intention of going to Bayocean. They express themselves as delighted with their trip, the beautiful scenery and the splendid roads. When told that they cannot reach Bayocean by auto and there is no road they are surprised. This is where Bayocean is handicapped right now, and the promoters of that resort are at a disadvantage. With the large amount of money expended in building up Bayocean and the large amount of taxes the lot owners and the company are paying into the county treasury every year, we feel that Bayocean is justly entitled to a way out and should have a road built in time for next year's summer travel, for we do not like to see a commendable enterprise suffer on account of being bottled up. The county has been spending large amounts of money building a road on the South side of Nehalem bay, from Mohler to Wheeler, which is a commendable improvement, but as the Bayocean project is somewhat similar and as highly commendable, we feel in justice to Bayocean that the work should be commenced with the \$5,000 the County Court promised to appropriate out of the taxes that were collected this year.

A Quiet Convention.

Some of the newspapers are talking facetiously about the quietness of the Populist National Convention which recently met in St. Louis. They say it afforded a welcome contrast to the turbulence of the gatherings at Chicago and Baltimore a few weeks earlier. For a party which once polled 1,000,000 votes, and which carried several states, they intimate that its recent exit is somewhat tragic. They are mistaken about the tragedy, but they are all right on the other points. There was nothing for the Populists to quarrel about, therefore they refused to get angry at anything. Not having any contested delegations, they omitted the formality of a credentials committee. As they had no funds except what each individual delegate carried, they declined to appoint any treasurer. For the reason that they had no longer a national organization they did not need to appoint a national committee. They reaffirmed the Omaha platform of 1892, which was the Koran of their party in its great days, but they skipped the little detail of nominating a ticket.

But where is the tragedy in this affair? By polling their 1,000,000 votes in 1892, thereby aiding Cleveland to get elected, they absorbed the Democracy shortly afterward, leaving Cleveland without a party in the later half of his second term, and then they compelled the Democrats in 1896 to nominate a man who had stumped several states for their candidate, Gen. Weaver, four years earlier. All of the doctrines which the Populists preached long ago which were not appropriated by the Democrats in 1890 or later on, were taken over by the Progressives at the recent convention at Chicago. There is more Populism than old-time Democracy of Tilden and Cleveland in the Wilson platform. Col. Roosevelt's creed is almost all Populism, with a few follies which the Ocula and the Omaha political carpenters did not think of.

The superfluity of a ticket was omitted by the Populists at St. Louis because the Progressives had got ahead of them in nominating it. There was nothing pathetic about the Populists' exit at St. Louis. Wilson and Roosevelt are doing their work, and shouldering their worries.

At a meeting of the National Soil Fertility League a speaker said a famine in the United States is inevitable unless the soil is greatly improved. The boys' corn clubs now found in every state are building wiser than they know.

As Vermont will furnish the first test of the temper of the people in advance of the plebiscite of November 5th, its work will be watched with interest by the politicians of all shades of opinion. It has been Republican ever since the early days of the party and is likely to remain in line this year. The Roosevelt party, however, may take some votes away from the Republican candidates. The colonel himself will make a few speeches in Vermont this week, and Senator Dixon and others of his leaders are also to talk there. Naturally, he wants to make the best showing which is possible for the "moral effect"

which it may have on the other states, especially on Maine, which vote a week later. The Republicans are alert and are making a strong canvass of the state.

As a personally conducted affair the third-term party has left the globs trotters completely in the rear. Cook has been the merest tyro compared with the ubiquitous colonel invariably and profusely on the spot.

Mr. Wells was once against Bryan but the Wells appointment as democratic treasurer is not necessarily a fresh attempt to knock Bryan into a cocked hat.

In its first plank the Democratic platform declares that a protective tariff is unconstitutional. Then the platform multiplies words on the subject, trying to hedge. Only the Democratic party could think to compromise on a violated constitution.

China also will hold a general election in November. Waiting for returns from back districts in a population of 400,000,000 looks like a steady job for several months.
