A GOOD DISPLAY OF HOME PRODUCTS.

Fairview and Nehalem First to have Exhibits of Garden Truck Grown by School Children.

70 lbs. FROM ONE POTATO.

Nehalem Had Splendid Display of Dahlias and Fancy Work and Other Products.

Although the display at Fairview on Friday was a good beginning for a starter, it was hardly as attractive as that at Nehalem, yet it had its special features, one of which was the hospitality in inviting the visitors to a splendid lunch and the literary program which followed with speeches from our leading citizens. Where Fairview beat Nehalem was in the amount of potatoes raised from one potato. Charlie Cater, who is a cripple, raised 70 pounds of potatoes from one potato. It was the early Oregon kind, one being given to each pupil. His potato had 13 eyes and cutting it into 13 pieces, he sowed it with the above result. When dug the potatoes were not ripe and with the exception of some large ones they had not fully obtained their growth. Leona Rupp was the next highest, getting 45 pounds from one potato. There was a good variety of other vegetables, including alfalfa, on display at Fairview, and as the ladies of Nehalem were highly commended for their fancy work and floral display, the ladies of Fairview are likewise to be commended for their hospitality in serving a bountiful lunch, which was served in capital style.

The display at Fairview was more strictly in compliance with the idea of those who started the movement to encourage school children to grow vegetables, for it was confined to them, whereas Nehalem branched out in other home products and made their display a little more attractive, especially with flowers, which added greatly to the pleasant features of the exhibition. No doubt that Fairview will add a floral display next year, for there are many pretty flowers raised in that vicinity.

A delegation from the Tillamook Commercial Club was present at Fairview and at Nehalem, and a large number of citizens went from this city and other parts of the county to Nehalem by rail and auto.

While Nehalem had by far the best and most artistically arranged display of home products, including vegetables, fruit, salmon, cheese,

butter, curios, a baby show, fancy needle work, the art of cooking, the floral features of the display was certainly highly commendable. The cheese that made Tillamook famous was what first met the eye as one entered the hall. This display was from the Mohler factory, which, of course, met with admiration. Butter also played a part in the display, which had been placed in a glass case containing ice.

The center of the hall was taken up with fancy work, and there was a large display of most beautiful laces and fancy needle work. This was greatly admired by the ladies, and it showed that the ladies of Nehalem are capable of producing as artistic and beautiful things to adorn the home as anywhere in the world. It was certainly a most beautiful collection, and highly commented upon.

The exhibits of fruits and vegetables were on the right of the hall. These were nicely arranged and were shown to their best advantage. The display of potatoes were good. They were clean looking and had the appearance of being fully matured. One cabbage, weighing 36 pounds, was the largest. All vegetables and fruits had a healthy looking appearance and for a beginning, was a good display.

On the other side of the hall was the culinary department, including cakes, jellies, bread, etc., and close to this was a large salmon swinging in the air as it ready to bit at a troll.

Quite a number of curios were on exhibition, which included a screen made of shells and a piece of Nehalem bees wax which had just been dug up on the beach weighing 40 pounds with "67" deeply cut on the side, the figures being 10 inches in length.

That which attracted most attention was the beautiful display of dahlias. The stage of the hall was used for the floral exhibit, and it presented a gay appearance with a splendid variety of these flowers. Mrs. Fred Zaddach had the largest display and the largest number of varieties of the most choice kinds. To give some idea of the number of dahlias she had on display, she had 200 varieties and numbers of each of these varieties made up her pretty display. Mrs. Zaddach grouped her flowers in bunches and blending the different colors, placed each bunch in a jar. Mrs. B. A. Todd had the next largest and prettiest display of dahlias, having over 50 varieties in her collection. Instead of grouping her display, Mrs. Todd selected long necked bottles and arranged them in rows, each row being raised several inches. One cactus dahlia was placed in each bottle, and with the different colors artistically arranged, her display presented a fine appearance. Mesdames Zaddach and Todd have gone to a great deal of trouble and expense in obtaining the choicest and latest varieties of dahlies. Their display at Nehalem on Saturday could not be excelled anywhere, and these ladies are deserving of a great deal of commendation for the floral display which greatly added to the beauty of the exhibition.

In the culinary department, Edith Thompson, who is only 10 years old, received a prize for making a cake.

The committee of management included F. A. Rowe, Mrs. Fred Zaddach, Mrs. E. K. Scovell and Mrs. B. A. Todd.

The Nehalem band, which was augmented by six pieces from the Tillamook band, gave open air concerts during the day, and to make the affair as pleasant as possible, a number of races took place in the afternoon.

Altogether the affair was a great success. It is predicted that next year the fair will be on a large scale with a larger display of dahlias, for it seems that Nehalem is going to take a lead in raising and displaying these gay looking flowers, which do so well in Tillamook County owing to climate conditions.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,--To all whom it may concern: That the Common Council of Tillamook City, Oregon, did on the 20th day of August, 1912, duly adopt Ordinance No. 248, providing for a continuation of Sixth Street, in Tillamook City, Oregon, from the West line of Second Avenue East to the East end of said Sixth Street as it is now established in Central Addition to Tillamook City, and the said Common Council did on said August 20th, 1912, appoint George W. Kiger, M. Melchior and T. H. Goyno, three disinterested freeholders of Tillamook City, to view such proposed street and make an assessment of the damages and benefits on account of the laying out of the street mentioned in said Ordinance, and did appoint Thursday, the 20th day of September, 1912, at the hour of 8 o'clock p.m., at the Council Room, in the Commercial Club Rooms, in Tillamook Block, Tillamook City, Oregon, as the time and place for said viewers to meet.

YOU ARE FURTHER NOTIFIED that the boundaries and terminus of the proposed street, being a continuation of said Sixth Street, are described as follows: Beginning at the southeast corner of Block 1 of Harter's Addition to Tillamook City, and being in the West line of Second Avenue East, and running thence West 300 feet to the southeast corner of Block 1 of Central Addition to Tillamook City, Oregon; running thence South 60 feet to the Northeast corner of Block 2 of Central Addition to Tillamook City; running thence East 300 feet to the West line of Second Avenue East, and running thence North along the West line of Second Avenue East 60 feet to the place of beginning; the Eastern terminus of said street is the West line of Second Avenue East, and the Western terminus of said Street is the East end of Sixth Street, in Tillamook City, Oregon, as the same is now established living between Blocks 1 and 2 of Central Addition to Tillamook City, and the property proposed to be appropriated for such purpose is described as a strip of land 32.32 feet in width of the entire south side of the said described street, belonging to Ida Martiny, and a strip 1.68 feet in width of the entire North side of said tract formerly belonging to J. 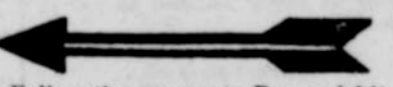

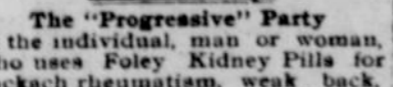
